 Fred Lockley
 The writer of this group of sketches and interviews of Oregon people is a newspaper man of broad experience. He has covered almost every foot of ground of the state of Oregon and has talked with thousands of its people. It contains such interesting chapters as "Early Mining Days," "Portland's First Automobile," "Lumberjack and Lumberking," "In the Days of the Stage Coach and Pack Horse."

Ox-Team Days on the Oregon Trail
 Earn Meeker
 This book makes the Oregon Trail live again. Every turn in the trail holds some tale of danger and daring of romance. It should be doubly interesting in view of Mr. Meeker's recent death.

Days and Deeds in the Oregon Country
 John E. Horner
 A delightful book. These are ten-minute stories offered as side-lights on Pacific Northwest history. The first chapter is "Frontier Explorations in the Oregon Country." Some years ago a lieutenant, Oregon, married to her husband, "Send a man to clean the spring; the drinking water's bad." Two men the next day picked up bones in the spring and a tank weighing a hundred pounds. "So you see, husband, you have been drinking elephant soup." This really happened in the year 1819 within 14 miles of Oregon State college.

HOME INVADED IN BEHALF OF CHILDREN'S HEALTH
 Teachers Handicapped, Parental Cooperation Necessary

"The teaching of health ought to, and will, in some more civilized age and country, be held a necessary element in the school course of the child, just as necessary as reading, writing or arithmetic. For after all, it is the most necessary of that technical education of which we hear so much, namely, the technique or art of keeping alive and well." So wrote the Rev. Charles Kingsley, the author of "Water Babies," a half century ago. His prophecy is being fulfilled, and we are at least partly "more civilized," for our schools are doing much for the preservation and improvement of the health of the children in their care.

The school cannot, however, do as much along this line as it might without the thorough understanding and cooperation of the home. It can teach the child how to read and write and cipher without the help of the parents, but when it comes to instruction in cleanliness, clothing, feeding, resting, etc., we have invaded the home, and must be met half way by sympathetic and willing parents if results are to be forthcoming. We can examine children physically in school, but if we get defects corrected we must have the consent of the home. School health work is thus a joint undertaking. It is true that many a home has been made more healthful through the lessons in hygiene carried directly from school, but this is by no means the rule. School health work needs also parental cooperation.
