YANKEES FAVORED IN JUNIOR LEAGUE

Weaker Clubs Strengthen and Interesting Race Is Predicted

CHICAGO, Jan. 25 (AP)—With revamped infield, more or less uncertain outfield and likely looking new coppers among battery men, the American league this year assumes the aspect of a one-ring circus with the New York Yankees the ringmaster.

Although the off-season was productive of deals designed to improve the various clubs it remains to be seen whether the changes have been for the better. On paper the trades seem to have struck a more even balance among the entries.

The weaker clubs seemed to have been strengthened while the first division teams' activities in the market apparently have not isolated their lineups to any great extent.

Promising Rookies

The New York Yankees have picked up promising rookie pitchers in Ed Walsh of Birmingham, Gordon Hughes of Hollywood and Floyd Van Pelt of Monticello but they will enter the race with a revamped left side of the infield, an aging outfield and an uncertain pitching staff that crumbled near the close of the 1928 season.

Mark Koenig will probably be shifted to third, with either Leo Burcher, the fiery little second baseman, or Lyn Lary, Oakland rookie, getting the call at shortstop.

The Philadelphia Athletics have added four rookie outfielders and a pitcher, a veteran outfielder, between the seasons with the St. Louis Browns' acquisitions consist largely of hot bats and reserve material.

Browns Showing Revival

The Browns made a big play in coming up from seventh to third place in one season but they were 13 games out of the first place last year when the Yankees nosed out the Athletics. Dick Ferrer, Columbus catcher, made a free trade by Commissioner Landis. He has the most important position in the Howley team. He may get the regular receiving berth.

Walter Johnson is counting on a lot of young pitchers and Budly Meyer, bought back from Boston for five players, to make his first year at Washington a success. The "big train" also will have an infield problem, Joe Judge being the only certainty and he is growing old.

The Chicago White Sox have their usual cavity at second base with no promising prospect. Second base is not the only problem facing Manager Lena Blackburne. He has nine aspirants for the outfield, a weak catching staff, to Lubber and the improvement of Bill Cossitt at short.

Tigers Have Few "Ins"

In contrast to the White Sox, Bucky Harris is going into his first year as manager of the Tigers with few "ins." Bucky is a great manager with a new club and a month his tentative lineup lacks the outfield punch, characteristic of the Tigers for 25 years, he has a hard working pitching staff strengthened by the Cleveland ace, Uble.

PA STRIBLING IN GOTHAM FOR TILT

Scouting Sharkey And Christner from Kingside This Evening

NEW YORK, Jan. 25 (AP)—A chubby little fellow with a soft smile from under the brim of his black derby today at things inside in the big town. Tonight he will sit at the ringside in Madison Square Garden and turn his entire attention to Jack Sharkey's efforts to bruise K. O. Christner—and vice versa.

The little fellow with the slow smile is "Pa" Stribling who raised his boy to be a fighter of such proportions that little Willie is now one of the leading heavyweights, one of the principals in the battle of the palms Tex Rickard planned for Miami Beach on the night of Feb. 27.

Scouting Sharkey
"Pa" came all the way north from the Florida resort to scout Sharkey, if the fates are smiling on the late promoter's plans and Christner, if necessary.

But with the preliminary scouting over and nothing left to do but wait for the fight pinapples to explode tonight "Pa" has time to dwell on the prospects of a record gate at Miami Beach and the enthusiasm for fights in general and Young Stribling in particular.

"The South," he said, "is just finding itself athletically. We had the greatest football team in the country last fall in Georgia Tech, Bobby Jones and Walter Gunn have thrilled the section with their golf and Ty Cobb made baseball fans of thousands. Now Young Stribling has come along to take his place as the foremost Southern representative in the boxing world.

Expects Huge Crowd
The Sharkey-Stribling match will be one of the biggest sport events in the history of the section and the boy must uphold the prestige of his predecessors, Georgians, and especially the fans of Macon, will move on Miami Beach almost to a man. There's never been anything like it down there.

"Florida never had but one big fight before and that was when the sport was practically outlawed. Those fans haven't had a real chance to yell since Jim Corbett stopped Charley Mitchell in Jacksonville 25 years ago.

You know, Southerners are more sentimental than Northerners or Westerners and we consider that this fight is something of a memorial to Tex Rickard. Tex was the man who gave the boy his chance and favored him to win the heavyweight championship. The south won't forget that."

Fans Fair
"The boy doesn't care who referees the match either. Sharkey is just as safe against prejudice in the south as he would be in New York. They'll boo him if they don't like the way he fights and they'll boo Stribling too.

"No one with any sense would want to steal a decision with newspapermen from all over the section at the ringside. I've always found that a poor decision against you reacts ultimately in your favor. You notice that Paulino fought Tom Heeney twice, won once and drew the other time, but the Spaniard didn't get the title shot with Tunney. Heeney got that because the newspapermen thought Tom won both battles."

CHRISTNER, SHARKEY READY

NEW YORK, Jan. 25 (AP)—While sweet dreams of Miami Beach unfold them, Jack Sharkey and K. O. Christner clash in a ten-round bout in Madison Square Garden tonight.

Christner, the rubber tire industry's gift to heavyweight ranks, is confronted with the chance of a life-time. A knockout victory for him would automatically shove Sharkey out of his match with Young Stribling at Miami Beach, Feb. 27. At the same time there is more than a chance that such

BOYS PLAY AT GAMBLING AND ONE IS SLAIN

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., Jan. 25 (AP)—Two 15-year-old boys sat down to a game of cards in a gambling hall of the old west.

Hyatt Stoutenburgh placed a rusty horse pistol, a family relic, on the table near his hand. John Reynolds put his trust in a 22-caliber revolver minus a trigger. The game started. Then to carry out the tradition of the frontier days they argued. Stoutenburgh picked up his pistol. "This," he said, "is the way they used to do it in the old days." He leveled the gun at Reynolds and pulled the trigger.

When the smoke cleared Reynolds was found with a bullet through the forehead. He died a hour later. Stoutenburgh later recalled he had shown Reynolds how to load the pistol and had forgotten to remove the charge. The police said the shooting was accidental.

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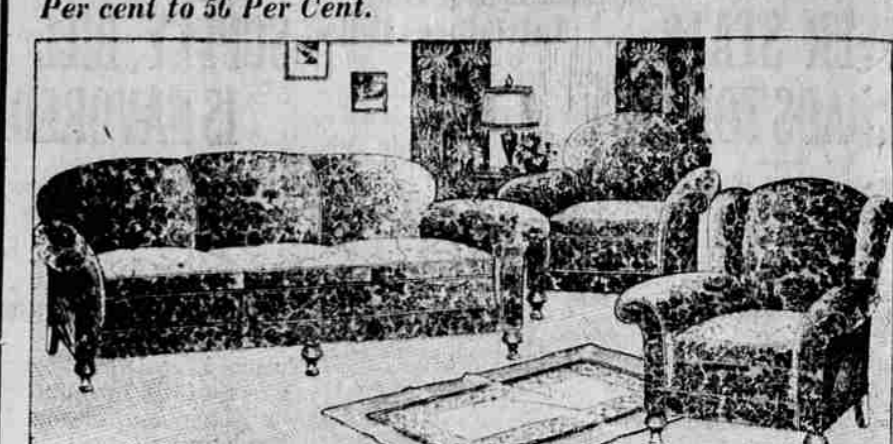
