MENUS

By Sister Mary
BREAKFAST — Tangerine oranges, cereal, cream, creamed potatoes, broiled cottage ham, graham muffins, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON — Scalloped lima beans and Spanish onion, tomato and banana salad, toasted muffins, milk, tea.

DINNER — Rabbit pie, baked winter squash, curly endive and celery salad, apple snow pudding, milk, coffee.

A garnish of pickled beets adds much to the dinner salad. The beets can be cut in fancy shapes or finely chopped and sprinkled over the thinly sliced celery. Either French or mayonnaise dressing can be used but for this particular meal mayonnaise is a good choice since the rest of the dinner is not heavy.

Tomato and Banana Salad
Four hot-house tomatoes, 3 bananas, 1 head celery, lettuce, mayonnaise.

Peel tomatoes and cut in slices. Line a salad bowl with lettuce leaves which have been carefully washed and crisped. Arrange slices of tomatoes on bed of lettuce and over them place bananas cut in slices. Sprinkle with celery cut in short match-like pieces and serve at once with mayonnaise.

If fresh tomatoes are not procurable a tomato jelly can be made from canned ones. The bananas and celery can be added to the jelly when stiffening or the stiff jelly can be cut in slices and the salad arranged in the same way the fresh vegetable is used. (Copyright, 1928, N.E.A. Service, Inc.)

Father Runs Amuck And Kills His Son

AKRON, Ohio, Jan. 25 (AP)—An attempt by George S. Thomas, a rubber worker, to kill his family and himself last night resulted in the death of his four-year-old son, Robert, the probable fatal wounding of his two-year-old daughter, Rosamond and himself, and the wounding less seriously of his wife, Thomas, in a rage, opened fire upon his family, the boy being killed instantly. He then fired two shots into his abdomen and drank poison.

Physicians said the wife, Helen, may lose her sight.

Fails to Evade Prison Sentence

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 25 (AP)—Judge Robert N. Ballgoff in federal court here this morning overruled the petition of Dr. Edward M. Shumaker, superintendent of the Indiana Anti-Saloon League, for a writ of habeas corpus. Mr. Shumaker is seeking to evade serving a 60-day sentence imposed by the supreme court for contempt.

Unless attorneys for the dry leader take some other legal action he will be compelled to go to the Indiana state penal farm to serve the 60-day sentence.
