BULL RAMPAGE IN EXCHANGE TODAY

Dozens of Issues Up from 5 to 17 Points; Closing Strong

NEW YORK, Jan. 25 (AP)—The bull party went on its most violent rampage of the new year on the stock market today, bidding up dozens of issues 5 to 17 points to new high ground. Trading was in enormous volume during the first two hours.

Johns Manville and Underwood Elliott Fisher led the upward swing with gains of 17 and 16 points respectively. Union Carbide, Radio, and General Electric mounted about 11 points. Nash Motors jumped 10 to a record price in an enormous turnover, reaching 117. Hasty profit-taking in the afternoon reduced the gains of Johns Manville and Underwood Elliott Fisher by five and six points. U. S. Steel fell off 3 points from its peak, and National Cash Register four. Operations for the advance were pushed forward in other sections of the list, however, Dupont (old) mounting 11 points, U. S. Industrial Alcohol, Allied Chemical, Commercial Investment Trust and American Machine and Foundry 7 to 5 points. The closing was strong. Total sales approximated 5,200,000 shares.

Increase of the membership of the New York stock exchange by 25 per cent making the roster 1,375 and with each member given the right to dispose of his proportional part of the increase within three years, has been recommended to members by the governing committee. It is expected that a vote of the membership, necessary to approval of the increase, will be taken within two weeks.

Wheat Firm And Higher at Close

CHICAGO, Jan. 25 (AP)—Opening 1/4 to 3/4 c up, wheat soon scored further gains. Corn started at 1/2 to 3/4 c advance, and with oats and wheat continued rising fast, corn being affected also by adverse crop reports from Argentina. Provisions were firm.

Wheat closed firm, 1/4 to 1/2 c net higher, corn 1/4 to 1/2 c advance, oats, 1/2 to 3/4 c up, and provisions varying from 2c decline to a rise of 12c.

WOOL REPORT
BOSTON, Jan. 25 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"The market this week has been rather on the quiet side. There has been an increasing interest in wool on the part of the manufacturers, however, as the week has progressed, more especially in the finer wools and one or two of the large mills have already secured a sizeable nest egg in fine Texas wools against the new season, or possibly against current contracts, for the mills have still a fair volume of old business on the books.

"New prices named by the American Woolen Company on staples practically unchanged, or in a few numbers slightly lower than six months ago, should prove attractive to the buyers of cloth.

"Contracting in the west is stopped.

"Foreign markets are fairly steady, although fine wools are not quite up to the level of early December either in London or in the colonies. Cross-breeds are very firm."

Eggs Drop All Along The Line; Butter Steady

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 25 (AP)—With the cold spell moderated and the snow rapidly disappearing, the expected decline in the price of eggs came with a thud. Bidding cut values all down the line. Standard extras dropped 2 cents and standard firsts followed with a 1 cent decrease. Medium extras and medium firsts dropped two cents. Today's prices were: Standard extras, 35 standard firsts 25, medium extras 30 and medium firsts 28.

Butter prices held stationary, with the exception of standard, which went down one cent to 43. Butterfat quotations failed to take any decline.

The orange war that began among Oregon City retailers a week ago has moved down upon the Portland market, especially among the wholesalers. Pivotal stocks (imported dealers) are reducing these by lowering the prices a bit, but instead of the move halting there it became a competitive squabble with the current general cutting of prices prevailing.
