MENUS

By Sister Mary

BREAKFAST — Chilled stewed prunes, cereal, creamed dried beef on toast, extra toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Turnip soup, toast, steak, cottage cheese and tomatoes, brown bread, canned peaches, chocolate cookies, milk, tea.

DINNER — Pot roast of veal, mashed potatoes, steamed mold of cabbage-escarole and grapefruit salad, chocolate pudding, milk, coffee.

Turnip soup is unusual but very good. If real stock is not at hand bouillon cubes can be used as a substitute.

Six cups sliced turnips, 1/2 cup melted butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 scant teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon lemon juice, 4 cups stock, 1 hard cooked egg.

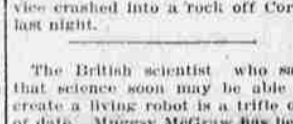
Portion and drain fat. Sauté in melted butter until slightly brown. Add flour, salt, pepper and lemon juice and stir until thoroughly blended. Add stock and bring to the boiling point, stirring constantly. Rub through a colander and return to the kettle. Bring again to the boiling point and serve with slices of egg scattered over the top. Dr. Lewis Will Speak Here On Sunday, Feb. 3

A prominent visitor in the city over the weekend next week will be Dr. Ida Belle Lewis, of Fochow, China who has been touring the northwest the past month and is now on her way to her home in Sioux City, Iowa. During the brief stay here, Dr. Lewis will be the guest at a number of social functions and will also occupy the pulpit of the First Methodist Episcopal church at the hour of the morning service, February third, having responded to the urgent request of Methodists here to bring some message. Dr. Lewis is considered one of the most able missionary speakers of the church.

A daughter of the late Bishop M. S. Lewis, missionary bishop to China, following several years as president of Morningglade college, Iowa, Dr. Lewis has until recently been president of Hwa Nan college, educational centers of that country. During the recent trouble in China, Dr. Lewis voluntarily withdrew from the presidency, and is now advisor to the president who is a native Chinese. This act on the part of Dr. Lewis called for considerable commendation from the Chinese government.

Dr. Lewis, who was the youngest missionary ever sent out by the Woman's Foreign Missionary society of the Methodist church, received her Ph. D. from Columbia university. She has written two books, one being "The Education of Girls in China." After ten years with Hwa Nan college she travelled over the world and studied colleges in India and other countries.

Dr. Lewis will spend the next six months filling speaking engagements in the middle west and will sail from Seattle in August for China to resume her work.

During her stay in La Grande, Miss Lewis will be the guest of Alice Kippel and Mabel E. Morton.
