LOS ANGELES, Jan. 30 (AP)—It looks like Earl Mastro, youthful Chicagoan, will have to be reckoned with before bantamweight title honors are definitely settled.

The clever mid-west youngster, last night in a ten-round bout that was one of the fastest and most colorful ever seen in this section, out-pointed Earl Francis, the Italian puzzle, in masterful fashion. The sixth saw Francis at his best, but Mastro, having solved his peculiar style, had the best of the going thereafter. He took two of the rounds, and held Francis even in the others.
