DEVELOP KOREAN CENTER. SEOU, Korea, (AP)—American capital has been invested in a Korean National Railway project to make Seou, the ancient city once known as the capital, Pyongyang, an industrial center. A railroad terminal is to be built outside the walled city and the American Corn Products Refining Company is expected to invest \$500,000 in a new factory and for increase of corn production. ## Salesman Held After Telling Of Death Pact

HARRISBURG, Pa., Jan. 29 (AP)—A perfume salesman's story of his survival of a suicide pact in which a woman was drowned was under scrutiny today.

As floating ice and low temperatures hampered efforts to retrieve the body of Miss Verna Klank, 30, from the Susquehanna river, the police contemplated making a formal charge of murder against Harry Bowman, 32.

Bowman said that by agreement he and Miss Klank had jumped into the river, that the woman was drowned, but that the icy water had brought him to his senses and he had climbed to safety.

Arrested With Woman.  
The salesman was arrested with Miss Ethel Miller, 26. She was accused of carrying concealed weapons.

He admitted having obtained \$1,025 from Miss Klank, part of the \$1,500 which Mrs. Alma E. Ebelin, mother of Miss Klank, mortgaged her home to finance her daughter in a candy business.

Bowman, who is married, charged Miss Klank with \$1,500. Ebelin said that she believed that he followed her. When arrested with Bowman, Miss Miller had \$400 in the trunk of her car and admitted that she had given Bowman \$150 for her by Bowman accounted for an additional \$150. Bowman had \$150 in his possession when arrested.

The relations of Bowman and Miss Klank puzzled the police. Bowman maintained that he was assisting her in the purchase of the store. He declared that Miss Klank's dependency over the fall-out to complete the purchase of the business was the reason for her suicide.

### Physicians Abandoning Term "Rheumatism" Now More Specific in Designating Types of Pain

Rheumatism is a term used by the layman to cover a number of physical ailments. Physicians have largely abandoned the term, however, and are much more specific in designating the various types of pain that occur in the back and extremities. There are four main divisions in this class of disease: (1) Rheumatic fever, (2) arthritis, (3) myositis and (4) neuritis.

Rheumatic fever is an infectious disease caused probably by the streptococcus, and occurs chiefly in children and young people. The infection is supposed to get into the system through the tonsils or throat. It then attacks the joints and the valves of the heart, and sometimes the germ invades the brain and causes chorea ("St. Vitus' dance"). A typical attack of rheumatic fever is characterized by fever, aches and hot, swollen, painful joints. The patient usually recovers from an acute attack, but is often left with an injured heart. After several attacks of this disease, the heart may be so badly damaged that the patient has to lead an invalid's life. The existence of this really serious disease is one of the chief arguments for removing diseased tonsils in children.

Arthritis may be either acute or chronic. Like rheumatic fever, it affects chiefly the joints, causing them to swell and become stiff and painful. The streptococcus is probably responsible for this condition also, and usually gets into the system through the tonsils, teeth or sinuses. Unless the disease is checked, it may produce great injury to the joints by causing permanent stiffness or deformity. To prevent this, the cause must be removed. Many physicians believe that vaccines are also helpful in the treatment. So far as we know, there are no drugs that will produce permanent cure.

Myositis is inflammation of the muscles. Good examples of myositis are lumbago and stiff neck. Myositis may come from injuries or bruises, but sometimes like arthritis, it is caused by diseased tonsils or teeth. Again the treatment should aim to remove the cause of the condition. Heating and massage are also very helpful.

Neuritis is an inflammation of the nerves. It is caused by toxins of various kinds, among the commonest of which is excessive alcohol. It is often associated with

lead poisoning. Neuritis, like arthritis and myositis, may be caused by bacteria that get into the system through diseased tonsils or teeth. Occasionally other infections, such as typhoid fever or influenza, are responsible for the condition. The proper treatment is one that eliminates the cause.

It is most important for the patient afflicted with any form of "rheumatism" to realize that drugs rarely bring about permanent cure of the condition. They may relieve the pain and are useful in this connection, but permanent relief seldom comes until the original cause of the trouble has been found and remediated. This is not always easy to do. It is necessary for the physician to become a sort of detective in his search for the criminal bacteria, and never to give up the quest until the culprit has been apprehended.

OIL FROM RUBBER SEEDS STRAITS SETTLEMENTS, (AP)—Rubber interests are investigating a new source of revenue, extraction of oil from rubber seeds, which long have been treated as refuse on Malayan rubber estates.
