STRIBLING AND SHARKEY IN PINK

Little Hard Training Is Needed to Put Them in Shape for Battle

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Jan. 31 (AP)—With Young Stribling starting his light training work and Jack Sharkey enroute to Miami Beach from Boston, details of the elimination bout in which the two will participate February 27 were dove-tailing today.
Stribling, accompanied by his family, arrived in Miami Beach last night. Sharkey, accompanied by Mrs. Sharkey, Johnny Buckley and Mrs. Buckley left Boston last night and will arrive tomorrow.
The Boston sailor said he will not inaugurate his training program for several days.
"I have nothing to do with the amount of training Sharkey and Stribling do," Dempsey said last night. "My concern up until now has been to see that they were both here by February 1."

In Good Condition
Stribling appears to be in excellent physical condition, Dempsey said last night after a banquet in honor of the Georgia contender.
"If Sharkey is in a similar condition, and I believe he is, the fight fans are going to see a regular show," Dempsey said. "Both of the boys are young and aggressive and they know their business."
The two fighters will do their training within half a block of each other. Sharkey's trainer, Tony Polozzo, had selected the Miami Beach Kennel club. Stribling will train in Haddie's Casino around the corner.

KAUFFMAN IS DEFEATED BY KOTSONAROS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 31 (AP)—When Clete Kauffman of Columbus, O., elected to rough it with George Kotsonaros, Hollywood wrestler-movie actor, in their match here last night, he found Kotsonaros perfectly willing and as a result Kotsonaros took two straight falls from the Ohioan. The first fall followed a succession of jolting reverse headlocks under the chin which sent Kauffman spinning dizzily to the mat. As he picked himself up from the third of these, Kotsonaros grabbed him with both hands by the head, swung him like a sack of grain over his own head and shoulders, then fell backwards on top of him. After they carried Kauffman to the dressing room and worked over him 15 minutes he gamely came back, but it only required 10 seconds for Kotsonaros to finish him with almost a repetition of the first fall, which required 45 minutes, 21 seconds.

CUBS TO GET LESTER BELL, REPORT SAYS

NEW YORK, Jan. 31 (AP)—The New York World says today that Lester Bell, third baseman of the Boston Braves will be traded to the Chicago Cubs at the annual meeting of the National League here Tuesday. The Braves will receive cash and probably a player or two.
Since the Braves claimed Joe Dugan from the Yankees by a deal for Bell has been expected. With his former teammate Rogers Hornsby, Bell is counted on to give the Cubs one of the strongest infields in the circuit. Third base was one of the weak spots in the Chicago machine last year, with Clyde Heek, who occupied the position most of the time hitting only .257.
Bell did not do much better, making only a .277 average but in 1926 his mark was .325 with the Cardinals and he was second only to Hornsby in driving in runs for the world's champions.

HARRISBURG Pa., Jan. 31 (AP)—A report that Lester Bell, of this city, was to be traded by the Boston National League club to the Chicago Cubs brought an expression of enthusiasm and joy from the major league third sacker at his home today.
"Good," said larruping Lester, "I hope it goes through."
"You know Rogers Hornsby is my pal and I will be glad to play with the Cubs because they will win the pennant."

Oregon State's Rook Team Made Up Of Big Boys

Oregon State college has a tall rook basketball team this year, so tall in fact that two of the regulars loom above Richard Lyman, six-foot center, who hails from La Grande. K. Pugsan, forward, is six feet and two inches tall and J. Hoarwell, guard, is one inch shorter than Pugsan. H. Merrill, forward, and Lyman are both six feet. T. Duffy, former Salem high school player, is the only "shorty" on the string—he is five feet seven inches from the ground up.
Besides the first stringers P. McCain and A. Gustafson, forwards, and W. Kieghly, guard, are all two yards tall and H. Lyons, center, is an inch taller than Lyman. M. Ashby and D. Kirk, guards, are 5 feet 10 inches.
The fact that Lyman, who scores frequently, is first string center in spite of his sub being taller, speaks quite a bit for the ability of the La Grander. It is said, and some predict that he will make the varsity in his sophomore year. The rooks plays two games with the Oregon Fresh Feb. 1 and 2.
