

Wallowa Digging Out From Heavy Snow This Week

WALLOWA, Ore., (Special).—Residents of this community have been engaged in the task of digging out from one of the most severe snow and wind storms experienced here in a number of years. Snow began falling early Friday and continued 12 or greater part of the day and on Friday night and Saturday developed into blizzard proportions which lasted the greater part of Saturday night. It is difficult to estimate the depth of the snow for the two-day period because of the fact that much drifting resulted piling roads and trails full. About a foot and a half of snow covers the lower portions of the county and further back into the hill sections it is much deeper. Much effort is being required at this time to break through the huge drifts and open the roads for travel. During the past two days there has been many men with teams traveling over the roads in an effort to get the snow packed down some. Elmer Southwick, coal carrier on route No. 1 has experienced some real difficulty in trying to get mail to patrons on that route. In making his trip Saturday with the roads only partly broken out he was able to get at 12 miles out and remained at the Joe Pougins farm at Leap over night and on Sunday, with the aid of Mr. Pougins and a number of other farmers in that section, was able to get over the remaining part of the route and back into town late in the day. The snow has been unusually deep on all roads in the valley and is also requiring much travel here to get them broken out sufficiently for cars to be used.

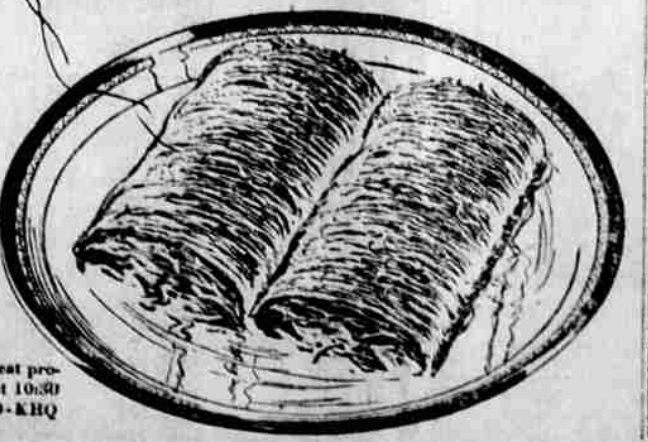

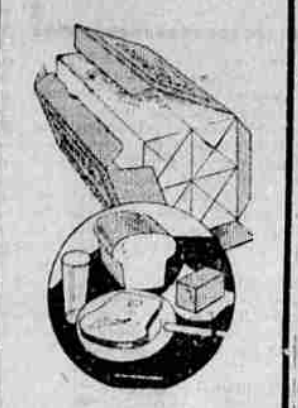
