Alienists Test Pastor-Fighter At To Sanity

OAKLAND, Cal., Feb. 1 (AP)—Rev. Frederick H. (Kid) Wedge, Presbyterian minister and former prize-fighter, today was held for observation by alienists as a result of his admission that he was obsessed by desire to strangle his bride of a week, or to throw her out the window of the hotel where they have been honeymooning.


Wedge attributed his obsession to a skull fracture suffered years ago in the ring, and said the trouble was aggravated by publicity which followed his marriage last week to a woman divorced on grounds unrecognized by the Presbyterian church.

On his wedding day, Wedge made a public announcement that he was unable to go ahead with the marriage, because the bride-to-be, Mrs. Jennie M. Holloway, had been divorced for incompatibility. He changed his mind later, and the ceremony was performed by Rev. C. D. Norris, pastor of the Berkeley church of the Nazarene. Mr. Norris said his superiors had threatened to unrock him for marrying a person divorced on unscriptural grounds.

Wedge was taken into custody after he went to an alienist for consultation. He was held in a cell at the Emergency hospital, but will be sent to the psychopathic ward of a larger hospital today.

He went through the trap and died instantly.
