MAX SCHMELING DEFEATS RIKKO

German Heavy Steps Into Contender Class by Virtue of Win

MAX YETIK, Feb. 2 (AP)—A new contender in the vacant heavy-weight throne has arisen, ready to back his aspirations with the power of his ten tons. Max Schmeling is his name. He comes from Germany.

He demolished tough Johnny Rikko into a technical knockout while 24,000 fans roared in Madison Square Garden last night. The end came after six rounds and five seconds of fighting in the ninth round of a ten-round bout.

Feature Evening

There is one about and furious evening. Schmeling accomplished more than did a half dozen or more of the leading heavyweights in the last year or so. Johnny fought them all last year and without national success. Since late 1927 Rikko has beaten Jack Delaney, Pauline Larkin, Jack Sharkey, and George Godfrey. He lost during the same period to Tom Heenan, Jimmy Mahoney and Ernie Wolf, on decision, and to Robert Robert on a foul and during all that time none of his rivals could put him on the floor.

Schmeling accomplished that feat in the fourth round. He started when the Texan swung his deadly right and the Cleveland boxer went down but bounced up without a second.

After taking a drubbing for the first two rounds, Johnny found himself in the third and began a steady body attack that had the German badly puzzled. The fourth was even but Johnny punished the weaving, bobbing foreign target in the fifth and sixth and took the seventh.

Rikko Got Down

Early in the seventh round, however, a stalling right cracked Rikko on the chin and he went down for a count of nine. He got up but heavily leaned out the round. The eighth was the same story and before long the German's heavy right again thrashed home and Johnny was down for nine once more. Only his gallant, fighting heart carried the rugged boxer out for the ninth round. Schmeling, who resembles Jack Dempsey not only in appearance but in the way of his attack, promptly smacked the Clevelander down for another count of nine and was waiting away when the referee half-carried Johnny to his corner.
