Dr. Lewis Is To Speak Here On Sunday Morning

Special Program Arranged at First M. E. Church—Pastor Will Speak in the Evening

One of the most interesting church programs to be given in La Grande tomorrow will take place at the First Methodist Episcopal church during the morning worship hour when Dr. Ida Belle Lewis, of Hwa Nan college, Foochow, China, will be the speaker.

La Grande is fortunate to have her appear in this city, it is said. She happened to stop here for a visit with two friends and consented to talk.

She is a daughter of the late Bishop M. S. Lewis and is home on sick leave following an almost fatal illness from typhoid. She will return to China in August to continue her work.

Dr. Lewis writes and speaks with great authority on present China problems and has won much fame as a speaker. She has been visiting colleges in the Northwest for six weeks and now has a six-month dating in the middle west.

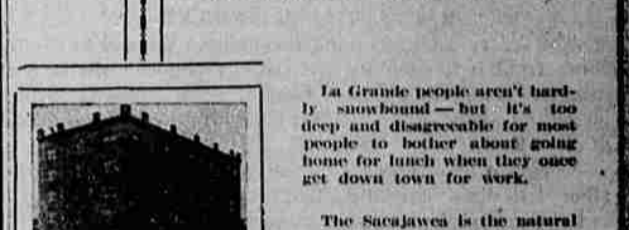
