Billiard Kings In Tournament For Cue Title

NEW YORK, Feb. 4 (AP)—With six masters of the cue in the field, the world's championship billiard tournament opened at the Hotel Club tonight.

To Edward Horowitz, the present title-holder, falls the honor of opening the tournament. The slender Belgian meets Kirsey Matsuyama, little Japanese holder of the world's junior championship, in the first of the 15 four hundred point matches at 8:30 tonight.

Tomorrow afternoon Walter Cochran, one of two American hopes, will play Eric Hazenbacher, German champion. In the evening Jake Schneider, son of the old wizard, will meet Felix Grange of France. Play will continue every afternoon and evening except Sunday with the wind-up a week tomorrow night.

For the first time in many years Willie Hoppe, long monarch of the billiard game, will not be a contestant. He finished sixth in a field of seven in the last tournament at Washington in 1927, and now devotes himself almost exclusively to three-cushion billiards.

With a half dozen masters of the game in the field there can be no outstanding favorite, experts, however, are disposed to eliminate Matsuyama and Grange from title consideration. The other four are rated with about equal chances of capturing the coveted crown which will carry with it a cash reward of approximately \$10,000. The runner-up will receive about \$5,000.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 4 (AP)—Tommy Loughran, light-heavyweight champion, and Emanuel, youthful San Francisco lawyer-boxer, rested on their guns today, their training ended for their 10 round battle at the Olympic auditorium here tomorrow night, with each in the proverbial "pink" of condition.

Loughran entered his second day of rest having topped off his conditioning last Saturday, while Emanuel completed his training yesterday. Rather than chance going stale doing nothing, Emanuel programmed some leg exercises for today. Loughran, however, had no work on his day's slate.

Emanuel finished up his training with a fairly stiff workout yesterday. He boxed at top speed for three rounds with Bert Collins, thirty whittler, Cal, Mexican middleweight, in addition to other routine exercises. The form displayed by the San Francisco boxer in his gymnasium workouts has done much to swing many into his following. Odds still remained in favor of the champion, however, being quoted at 10 to 3 and 10 to 5.

When Connie Mack assembles his Athletics at Fort Meyers this spring, special attention will be given one, George W. Earnshaw.

Earnshaw is one of the best pitching prospects of the American League and incidentally the apple of Mr. Mack's eye.

Last year, his first in the majors, George got off to an indifferent start, but in the closing days of the campaign made good the expectations Connie Mack had for him.

Earnshaw is a tall, rangy right-hander, and his specialty is speed. None other than Bucky Harris, manager of the Detroit Tigers, says Earnshaw has more stuff than any first year pitcher he has seen in years.

Harris blames George's wild streaks on the fact the big pitcher takes too little time between pitches and a smart batter can upset him by a little well-timed stalling at the plate.

Last year he took part in 26 games, winning seven and losing the same number. While this may not be anything to throw convulsions over, it remains that he came fast during September, and it's likely he'll still have plenty of momentum when they start the season in April.

Connie Mack hand-picked Earnshaw from the Baltimore Orioles, the team that gave Lefty Grove, George's illustrious teammate, to the majors.

Experts Wonder If Weather Will Bother Sharkey

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 4 (AP)—The dopesters were in hard training today for the Sharkey-Stribling fight February 27, although the principals in the battle of Miami Beach gave no indications of being overburdened with worry.

While Young Stribling, pride of Macon, Ga., and Jack Sharkey, erstwhile Boston mob, sought the surf and golf courses in indifferent attempts at conditioning, the goggle-eyed group which have watched the boxers' every manlike stroke since their arrival here last week, began their serious work of advance expiring.

So far, the weather has let other topics in early speculation. It has been argued loudly that Sharkey, fresh from the cold north, will be handicapped by the balmy breezes, while the Georgian is conceded the advantage of knowing his weather.

Now that he has finished the signing of contracts, even down to the peanut concession, and has seen the stadium begin to grow, Promoter Jack Dempsey also apparently has cast aside care and has been engaged in counting ticket receipts.

Both Sharkey and Stribling believe their recent fights have put them in shape for the bout, and intend to engage, only in light work.

MISS NEITZEL WINS SKATING CHAMPIONSHIP

MINNEAPOLIS, Feb. 4 (AP)—Miss Loretta Neitzel of Detroit, today holds three new world's skating records and the women's amateur senior outdoor speed skating championship of America.

Miss Neitzel set new marks in the 440 yard and one mile events in competition, and then in a race against time, established a record for one-sixth of a mile.

Five seconds fell off the old time in the 440 when Miss Neitzel covered the distance in 39 2-5 seconds. The former mark was held by Mrs. Leile Potter of Toronto.

The Detroit woman flush completed the mile event in 3:16 4-5, which was 2 and 3-5 seconds faster than the record time of Mrs. Potter.

In the race against time, Miss Neitzel beat her own figure of 22 seconds for one-sixth of a mile, making it in 39 2-5 seconds.

Miss Neitzel so far outclassed the field of women skaters that she had little difficulty in amassing 110 points for the championship.

UNION, (Special)—A proposed trip to Ontario by the basketball girls from the Union High school had to be given up owing to the snow blocking the road east of here. The Ontario girls played an exhibition game here with the Union High sextet during the tournament last spring and the local team was going to play a return game last week.

Haines High school was represented here Saturday night by both the boys and girls in a double header basketball contest with the Haines and the U.-H. girls' teams. The girls' game was played first and easily won by the local team, although the visitors fought hard during entire four quarters. One field basket in the first quarter and another in the third told the entire story for the Haines scoring. Union totaled 25 points, 12 field goals and 5 successful tries for goal from the foul line. Weaver and Smith displayed their usual team work as forwards. Jory played center most the game, being replaced for a short time by Cline, and several others took turns as running center and guards.

Coach Coburn began the second game with J. Parent and Delap as forwards, Wilde as center, and J. Miller and Davis as guards. S. Parent also played part of the game. The contest was so evenly fought that the outcome was in doubt until the last few minutes of the fourth quarter when Union forged ahead five points. The first quarter ended Union 8, Haines 7, the half 10 to 7, as the visitors failed to score during the second period, and the third quarter saw the two teams tied, at 16 points. The last period was a frantic struggle to gain the slight lead necessary before the final signal. Haines had several opportunities for baskets, but their shooting was less accurate than Union's, and the
