CHAIN PROGRAMS
LIKED HE SAYSCommissioner LaFount
Testifies at Radio Hearing
in Washington

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4 (AP)—Commissioner LaFount, of the federal radio commission, told the senate interstate commerce committee today that the radio public generally wants to hear programs broadcast over chain hook-ups.

While the opinion does not seem to be unanimous in this respect, he said, many protests have been made by radio listeners against small stations broadcasting the same songs by the same Sally Jones' night after night.

Members of the committee, which is considering a proposal to prolong the federal radio commission for another year, questioned LaFount as to the need for high power stations. He said, while the 50,000 watt stations may not be heard in a territory much larger than a 10,000 watt station, the reception is clearer.

Senator Dill, democrat, Washington, said it was his idea that the people would be better served by regional stations, but Senator Fess, republican, Ohio, declared that people in his state have protested against being unable to get programs of fine music which the chain broadcasts.

Some communities, LaFount declared, protest over hearing the "prices of automobiles and prunes" broadcast by the smaller stations, while others want regional service. He said this phase of radio broadcasting was being studied by the commission.

LaFount contended the commission should be continued. He told the committee tentative agreement had been reached between United States and Canada with respect to the allocation of short wave lengths for radio in North America. He said he would prefer not to disclose the nature of the agreement unless committee members insisted. The question was not pressed.

sons was on hand for a glimpse of the take-off, and as Lindbergh came out of the hangar, police were unable to maintain order, the crowd breaking across the field. Lindbergh turned and held up his hand and the crowd halted.

While officers were re-establishing order, Lindbergh waited, refusing to bring the plane out of the hangar until the field had been cleared.

Photographers Disappointed—A score of photographers who had braved the early morning rain to get pictures of Colonel Lindbergh's departure were barred from the field. Officials of the company said it was Lindbergh's request that no pictures of his departure be taken.

The new mail route will bring the Panama Canal Zone within two days of the United States against the present required travel of from six to 15 days.

tential murderer craved with drink threatened the lives of a number of the residents of the lumber mill settlement of Pondosa. Upon telephone communication with the sheriff of Union county we were advised there were no police officials available at the time and none could reach the locality within several hours. The gravity of the situation necessitated obtaining authority from the Union county sheriff to enable the Baker county sheriff to provide the necessary protection.

The school district being at present composed of contiguous territory of Union and Baker counties presents an undesirable complication as regards official county supervision, and in the event an annexation were completed, would result in placing school district under the management of one county superintendent.

The north boundary of the territory proposed to be annexed follows the crest of the watershed between the waters of Big Creek which flows southerly into the Baker Valley basin, and Catherine creek which flows northerly into the Grande Ronde basin, thereby forming a natural boundary of adjacent counties.

The roads leading to the Medical Springs district from La Grande via Tule Lake and from Union via Catherine Creek are, as indicated on accompanying map, impassable in the region of the divide save for a period of about five months during the summer season, and at the present writing five feet of snow has been recorded on these roads, no traffic having passed thereon since the latter part of November.

The emergency hospital conducted by the Grande Ronde Lumber company, whose interests are now within the territory in question, being previously maintained at La Grande, was of necessity moved to Baker, Oregon, for the sole reason that accessibility to and from the mill and hospital was of supreme importance.

The residents of this territory have ever enjoyed amiable relations, both social and commercial with the city of Baker, and coupled with the fact that there is a dire need of being in closer relationship with county officials, the residents of the district are unreservedly committed to the proposition of the annexation of this territory as being most desirable and necessary.

Adventurous Boy Faces Execution

LIVERPOOL, Eng., Feb. 4 (AP)—Joseph Reginald Victor Clarke, who had an adventurous career in Europe and the United States and was known as "the boy with a hundred sweethearts" was sentenced to death today for the murder of Mrs. Alice Fontaine.

It took the court just four and one-half minutes to try, convict and sentence the youth who had pleaded guilty to killing the woman, with whom he boarded, by strangulation.

H. R. H. to Act For King of England

LONDON, Feb. 4 (AP)—For the first time since King George's illness, the Prince of Wales tomorrow will act for his majesty in receiving official visitors.

The prince will receive them at York house, his visitors including officials and public servants relinquishing various posts. In the normal course they would have gone to Buckingham palace to be received by the king.

Translating his sympathy for the unemployed coal miners into actual help, the prince is providing funds through his estate "The Duchy of Cornwall" to send two families to the Selly Island, where they will be trained in bulb and flower growing.

will be complete early in May.

Before going to Pendleton Inlow was for six years at the head of the Forest Grove schools and for six years he was a director of the Eastern Oregon summer normal school. In 1922 Inlow was president of the Oregon State Teachers' association. He has a bachelor's degree from Pacific university, a bachelor of law degree from the University of Oregon, and is preparing to take a master's degree at Stanford.

President Inlow, of the Eastern Oregon Normal school, as well known in La Grande and pleasure has been expressed by many local people at his selection to head the La Grande institution. Mr. Inlow has had considerable experience in normal school work, having served as a director of the Eastern Oregon summer normal school for six years.

Miss Redfield Nominated

According to word received here, Miss Ethel Redfield, for three terms state superintendent of schools in Idaho, was the only other candidate placed in nomination. She formerly lived in Albany.

During the meeting, which A. T. Hill, president of the La Grande city commission, attended, the regents went on record as opposed to any change in the names of the three normal schools. It was indicated that such a change might be attempted during the present session of the legislature.

To Prepare Study Course—A committee composed of Mr. Bryant, J. H. Fuller and E. E. Bragg, was appointed to prepare, with the assistance of the presidents of the three schools, a course of study placing Oregon's normal schools on a four-year basis. In other words, the normal schools would have a four-year course in addition to the present two-year course.

The normal school here, which will be completed this spring, will cost approximately \$175,000, including construction, operation and equipment. The site was donated by the citizens of La Grande.

PENDLETON, Feb. 4 (AP)—The school board here has not yet selected a successor to H. E. Inlow, superintendent of city schools here, who was Saturday appointed head of the La Grande normal school.
