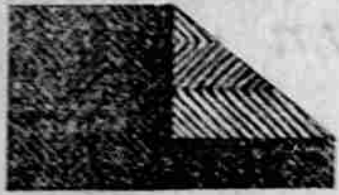

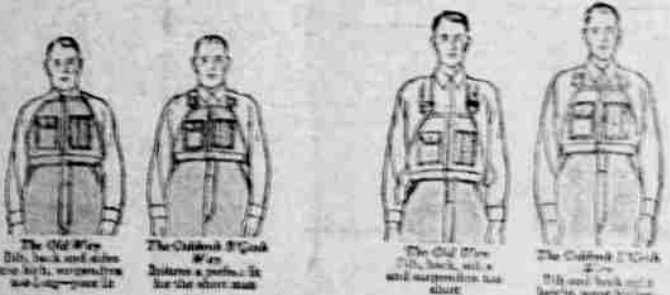

Although a sprinkling of issues fell back 2 to 3 points on profit-taking and scattered bear selling, a heavy lot of issues were selling 2 to 3 points above yesterday's final quotations by early afternoon. Trading showed a marked contraction in volume, presumably in response to the cautionary advice of some of the leading commission houses.
