Income Tax Pointers

No. 4
A taxpayer, though unmarried, who supports in his home one or more relatives over whom he exercises family control, is the head of a family and is entitled to the same exemptions allowed a married person, \$2,500. Also, he may claim \$400 for each person dependent upon him for chief support if such person is under 18 years of age or incapable of self-support because mentally or physically defective. Such dependent need not be a relative of the taxpayer nor a member of his household. The term "mentally or physically defective" includes not only cripples and those mentally defective, but persons in ill health and the aged. For example, if an unmarried son supports in his home an aged mother, he is entitled to an exemption of \$2,500, plus the \$400 credit for a dependent, a total of \$2,900. If, from choice, the mother lives in another city, the son, although her chief support, would be entitled only to the \$1,500 exemption, plus the \$400 credit. The mother not living with him, he is not considered the head of a family. The \$400 credit does not apply to the wife or husband of a taxpayer, although one may be totally dependent upon the other. An exemption as the head of the family can be claimed by only one member of a household.

Hobohemia Pictured In "Beggars of Life"

Tramps know more about human nature than any other group of people, according to Jim Tully, who rose from hoboland a few years ago to become America's most widely read author of stories of tramp life.

"Few people I have met in other classes have the hard and keen discernment of life that many tramps have," says Tully.

America's Hobohemia, which includes a half million members, is dramatically depicted in Tully's "Beggars of Life," a Paramount production.

"Hobos are primitive and therefore more intuitive than subtle," declares the "sprinklelighter." "It would no doubt have shocked many a leader of industry had he known that I, a young beggar on the street, could read in his face whether he would give me a quarter."

"I did this as a gamble once with another young handholder. He would pick out a dollar 50 for me. As he walked toward me I would read kindness or meanness in his face. I failed once but of eleven times and the man who refused me had just finished arguing with a taxi driver."

"A clever young beggar can hope to succeed in obtaining small change from about thirty per cent of the people he approaches. That is if the street has not been 'worked' too hard."

Cameraman Was Hero of Flight Of Zeppelin

The unseen hero of the remarkable three-reel talking motion picture, "Across the Atlantic via Zeppelin," produced by Metro-Goldwyn Mayer in association with Hearst newspapers, which will be at the Arcadia theatre today is Robert Hartman. While Lady Drummond Hay and Dr. Hugo von Eckener are the outstanding principals, appearing in many of the scenes and contributing the dialogues, it was Hartman, the first and only cameraman to fly across the Atlantic, who took the greatest risks while making this amazingly thrilling and novel picture.

Flying across Europe Hartman, leaning out of a window of the cabin of the Zeppelin with his camera's nose pointing downward, secured some of the most magnificent air scenes ever made.

Then as the ship continued on her long hop over the Atlantic Hartman's real work began. Along the narrow cat's walk in the interior of the dirigible, Hartman dragged his 100-pound camera to make scenes from one gondola showing the side of the ship and a view of the gondola ahead and the waves of the ocean 3,000 feet below. He crawled up a crazy ladder inside the Zeppelin and stuck the camera through a trapdoor on the "roof" of the big bag. The wind pressure was so terrific that several of the crew had to hold on to Hartman's body; but he succeeded in getting one of the most remarkable shots of the whole trip, showing the very top of the bag as the dirigible sped across the Atlantic a hundred miles an hour.

It was when the cross-currents of the Gulf Stream rent a fin of the Zeppelin that Hartman secured one of the most amazing pictures of the trip.
