PREVENT TYPHOID BY SAFE-GUARDING WATER SUPPLIES

Prior to 1903 there were no health regulations in this state. It was the usual thing in most of the cities of Oregon to have two epidemics of typhoid fever annually. In the spring and in the fall, physicians in general practice drew a goodly proportion of their income from the care of typhoid patients. There was no reliable record previous to 1903 but in that year the record was over 14 deaths for 100,000 population or over 140 cases of typhoid to the 100,000 population. The economic loss from typhoid fever ran annually into more than a million dollars.

As a contrast read the reports for 1927 which record only four deaths for 100,000 population or about 40 cases. This was accomplished by an improvement of the water supplies under the supervision of the State Board of Health. Every year the inspection has been more thorough and the result is that there is very little water-borne typhoid fever in the state of Oregon at the present time.

Natural water in a settled community can be regarded no longer as safe. There is an unavoidable contamination of the ground and surface water by human waste. Bacteria can water be proven absolutely to be a source of an epidemic, for the reason that the germ causing contamination will rarely persist in the water long enough to be found after the epidemic has developed. Other signs of contamination which are considered very good circumstantial evidence are often found, however. Colon bacilli, for instance, will not cause typhoid, but when they are found in water it really means that probably bowel contents have reached the water and such water is very liable to have typhoid germs in it. Sometimes the contamination is not continuous but intermittent, and in such a case it may be impossible to prove actually by laboratory methods that the water is at fault. In case the water is suspected, it is wrong to conclude that it is safe because of one or two or even more negative laboratory reports.

A joint return and claim an exemption of \$2,208.33; that in 7-12 of \$1,500 for the husband while single, or \$875, plus 7-12 for the wife while single, plus 5-12 of \$3,500, or \$1,458.33, for the period during which they were married. If husband and wife make separate returns each may claim a personal exemption of \$1,004.17. The husband is entitled to 7-12 of \$1,500, or \$875, for the period during which he was single and 5-12 of \$3,500, or \$1,225, for the period during which he was married. The wife is entitled to a similar exemption. Similar provision is made with respect to the head of a family. A person who, on July 31, 1928, ceased being the head of a family—the support in one house—

hold of a relative or relative being discontinued—is entitled to an exemption of \$2,000.67, which is 7-12 of \$3,500, plus 5-12 of \$1,500.

With respect to the \$400 credit for a dependent, the taxpayer's status as of the last day of the taxable year determines his credit. If during the year his support of such dependent ceased, he is not entitled to this credit.

Income Tax Pointers

No. 5
Many persons married during the taxable year fail correctly to compute the amount of their personal exemption.

The revenue act of 1928 provides that if the status of the taxpayer changes during the year, his personal exemption shall be determined by apportionment, in accordance with the number of months the taxpayer was single and married. For example: A couple married on July 24, 1928, may file
