Here and There In Legislature

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 8 (AP)—A lengthy debate that grew red-hot at times preceded passage by the senate yesterday of senate bill 100 that places Grand Army members, disabled war veterans and chamber of commerce secretaries on the list of those to whom railroads would have to give passes or reduced fares in Oregon.

The bill, introduced by the committee on railroads and utilities, had been substituted for the bill extending the privilege only to Grand Army veterans.

Senator Bennett, of Multnomah county, took violent opposition to the new bill, declaring he had desired to vote that the favor be given the aged veterans and that he resented any effort to make him vote the privilege for chamber of commerce secretaries because he favored the Grand Army men and disabled war veterans. He termed it "the most unhandicapped piece of legislation that has appeared."

Klepper, of Multnomah, took a similar view and tried to get the bill tabled. He predicted that at the next legislature the state house would be full of chamber of commerce secretaries lobbying for the railroads.

Faster railway time between northwest cities and Chicago is the object of a joint resolution introduced Thursday by Senators Corbett and J. O. Bailey. It provides for a committee of two senators and three representatives confer with a like committee from the Washington legislature and northwest railroad officials relative to the subject. President Norblad appointed Bailey and Corbett as the senate members.

Senator Corbett tossed a monkey wrench into pending highway legislation Thursday by introducing a joint resolution calling upon the state highway commission not to issue any more bonds for road construction, and to spend no more money at this time on the Roosevelt coast highway, but to complete other state highways according to the original program. The resolution pointed out that the state has expended \$5,948,000 on the Roosevelt highway, and the counties \$4,204,849, and that 32

The more radical the plan for reorganization or consolidation of state government, the less chance its proponents will have securing the electorate's approval. He stated, however, that he would not favor a plan that was a "triumvirate" with the board of control having all executive powers. He merely wants, he said, the legislature to have power to assign special duties to the board of control instead of the governor if an occasion should arise when the legislature was unwilling to trust the governor alone.

A dozen house bills prepared by the Oregon County Clerks' association making amendments in the election laws passed the senate Thursday. The most important one provides that candidates in primary elections must file their

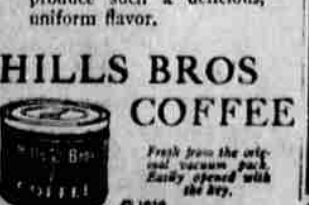
