MENUS

By Sister Mary
BREAKFAST—Stewed prunes, cream, baked French toast, sirup, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON—Mock sausage, creamed celery, new onions and radishes, rye bread, apricot Baccalan cream, milk, tea.
DINNER—Fresh shoulder of pork stuffed and roasted, corn custard, curly endive with French dressing, jellied cranberries and apples, milk, coffee.

The butcher should remove the bone from the pork shoulder in such a way that a deep pocket is made. Fill with a well-seasoned bread or chestnut stuffing, sew up and roast as usual. To serve cut in slices crosswise.

Mock sausages
 One-half cup dried lima beans, one fine dried bread crumb, 3 tablespoons melted butter, 1 egg, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, milk, 1 tablespoon catsup.

Soak beans in cold water to more than cover for three hours. Drain and cook in boiling water to which 1/2 teaspoon soda has been added. Cook ten minutes and drain. Simmer in cold water and return to saucepan with boiling water to cover. Simmer until tender. Drain and rub beans through a sieve. Add crumbs, catsup, melted butter, salt, pepper and egg slightly beaten. Mix well and add milk to make moist. Shape in form of frankfurters and roll in crumbs. Brush over with melted butter and bake in a hot oven until brown and crispy on the outside.

Eastern Names For New Spring Silks

 PARIS (AP)—Original names are introduced into the fabric vocabulary for spring by Rodier, the French fabric manufacturer, who gave the words Kashia and Jersakasha to the fashion language. Technism and amida are the most important of the new materials with Eastern names.

Technism is a lightweight silk with texture like a super-quality chiffon of fine weave. Much of it is printed with small delicate designs influenced by Japanese art and colorings. Samida is a heavier silk with a finish like very fine cashmere wool. It is also used for printed patterns, of oriental character. The two silks are combined for square and triangular scarves of vital colorings and oriental or modernistic printed patterns.

Woolyol promises to be an important spring dress material. Rodier shows it extensively in plain color and fine checks.

Beige is the basis for the summer collection of the premier French manufacturer of woolsens. He shows many cream and brown mixtures and fancy weaves for coats. Plain beige and beige mixtures are the leading color for coat materials, with dark blue following. Almost no black is included in Rodier's spring fabrics and not a great deal of black and white.

Novelties for sweaters are a porous wool fancy weave jersey called "moussa millious" meaning thousand holes, and a feather-weight jersey for sweaters and scarves named Jersaplume or feather-jersey.

Hulle is a new coating with heavy threads and fancy basket weaves. It is shown in beige and dark blues largely.

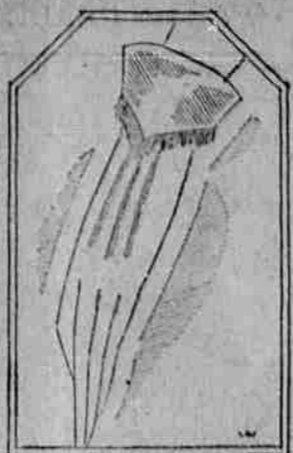
Cannot the library be of service to you in your selection of books for your literary calendar? We are rather proud of one circulation for January which was 10,132. Somebody must be reading at any rate.
