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Riverside county authorities as a witness during the trial. He is alleged to have been brought into this country illegally by Northcott more than two years ago.

Deputies led by Sheriff Clem Sweeters went to Northcott's chicken ranch near Wineville, following directions given by Northcott in his cell after jury had found him guilty of murder in the first degree without recommendation for clemency.

No Bones, Bodies Found The officers dug in several spots near the abandoned farm, particularly under a "mound" described by Northcott. No bodies or bones were found.

Northcott's temperament today appeared mercurial. He dropped from heights of self-confidence to depths of despair within a few minutes.

He ate no breakfast. Soon afterward he asked to see a priest and one was taken to him.
