

GERMAN DEFEATS YOUNG SCHAEFER

Outcome of Match Leaves Japanese Only Billiardist With Clear Record

NEW YORK, Feb. 8 (AP)—Kirey Matsuyama stood alone today as the only unbeaten contestant in the world's championship 15.2 ballroom billiards tournament. But the little Japanese over at least a part of his exalted position to some exceedingly brilliant billiardists by Fritz Hagenclocher, the pitifarnic German.

Unbeating a run of 267, highest of the tournament, last night, Hagenclocher gave young Jake Schaefer his first defeat and achieved, for himself, his first victory.

With seven of the 15 matches down on the books, Matsuyama now leads the procession with two victories and no defeats. The runner-up is the defending champion, Eduard Horemann, of Belgium, with two wins and a single loss to the Japanese, lunched behind the leaders are Schaefer, Hagenclocher and Walker Cochran, of Hollywood, such with an even break in two starts. Felix Grange, of France, brings up the rear with three setbacks in a row.

The Hagenclocher-Schaefer duel last night was the closest and most exciting of the tournament.

Young Jake was in form from the start and quickly ran up a lead of 199 to 63 at the end of the 4th inning. Here Hagenclocher got the balls together and nursed them along until he had counted 267. A long two-cushion effort failed on his 26th cue ball. After that the match was a long drawn out affair, cautiously played by both contestants. Hagenclocher finally ran out in the 17th inning with an unfinished run of five.

Huskies Facing Two Hard Games This Weekend

SEATTLE, Feb. 8 (AP)—Although tonight and Saturday's battle of the Washington basketball team to stay at the head of the procession is holding the interest of cage fans in the northern division of the Pacific coast conference, the traditional tilt between Oregon and Oregon State college at Eugene Saturday night is coming in for its share of speculation.

Instead of facing one hard game on the road trip the Huskies are primed to battle against the strong Washington State quint tonight and against the powerful Vandal five the following evening on the Moscow floor. Idaho had been given only a percentage chance to top the northern division honors until the Cougars bowed to an overwhelming defeat earlier in the week. With that victory stamping the Idaho aggregation as a powerful contender, Coach Lee Edmondson of the Huskies was pessimistic about the outcome of the first swing of the home floor.

In the Oregon-Oregon State game, the Webfoots will be endeavoring to gain a fourth position place. They will step above the state college team in the standing by winning the game on their home floor. Neither of the Oregon teams have a chance to step into the leadership of the northern division but both are being pointed to make it tough for the leaders when the return games are played.

Southern division conference teams do not swing into action until tomorrow night, when Stanford meets California and Southern California tackles the University of California at Los Angeles.

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Dempsey Ahead On Miami Beach Fight, Is Report

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 8 (AP)—Jack Dempsey and the Madison Square Garden corporation were some \$20,000 to the good on the Sharkey-Stribling fight today, if estimates of the cost of the February 27 slug-fest prove correct.

Dempsey has announced ticket sales for the Flamingo Park match already have reached \$139,000 which exceeds by \$20,000 the estimated cost of the spectacle.

Promoter Jack also announced the arena would be ready for the customers in ample time.

Meanwhile the principals have added ring workouts to their golf course training for the projected affair. The Boston sailor went through a stiff workout yesterday with the light and heavy bags, and indicated he would get down to "real hard work" Monday on his return from Tampa, where he will watch a boxing match tonight.

Stribling held to his nightly road work, but expects also to get in several strenuous workouts at his Hardie's Casino training camp before his departure for the Everglades Tuesday on a fishing expedition.

Dempsey took occasion last night to deny again that he has signed a contract to fight in September. While admitting Sharkey has signed for a Madison Square Garden battle if he wins from Stribling and that the wife of Maroon also has agreed to a fight, he himself has signed no contract, he said.
