and a single executive Senator Schumacher dropped another bomb into the disturbed legislative status of the institutions of higher learning by introducing a bill substituting a state board of higher education for the board of regents of the university and college and abolishing the board of higher curricula.

EXTRA WEEK LOOMS
SALEM, Ore., Feb. 9 (AP)—With the normal expiration date of the Oregon legislature only two weeks away, but with an additional week certain, and perhaps two extra weeks, most of the battles of the session are in the future.

The work of the session so far, in number of measures passed, averages well enough with previous sessions, and the governor is keeping abreast of the legislation in his approvals. So far the governor has returned no vetoes. In volume of important matter passed so far the score is not high.

A check today shows that a total of 192 bills have passed both houses of the legislature, 12 senate and 89 house bills, and 71 of them have been signed by the governor.

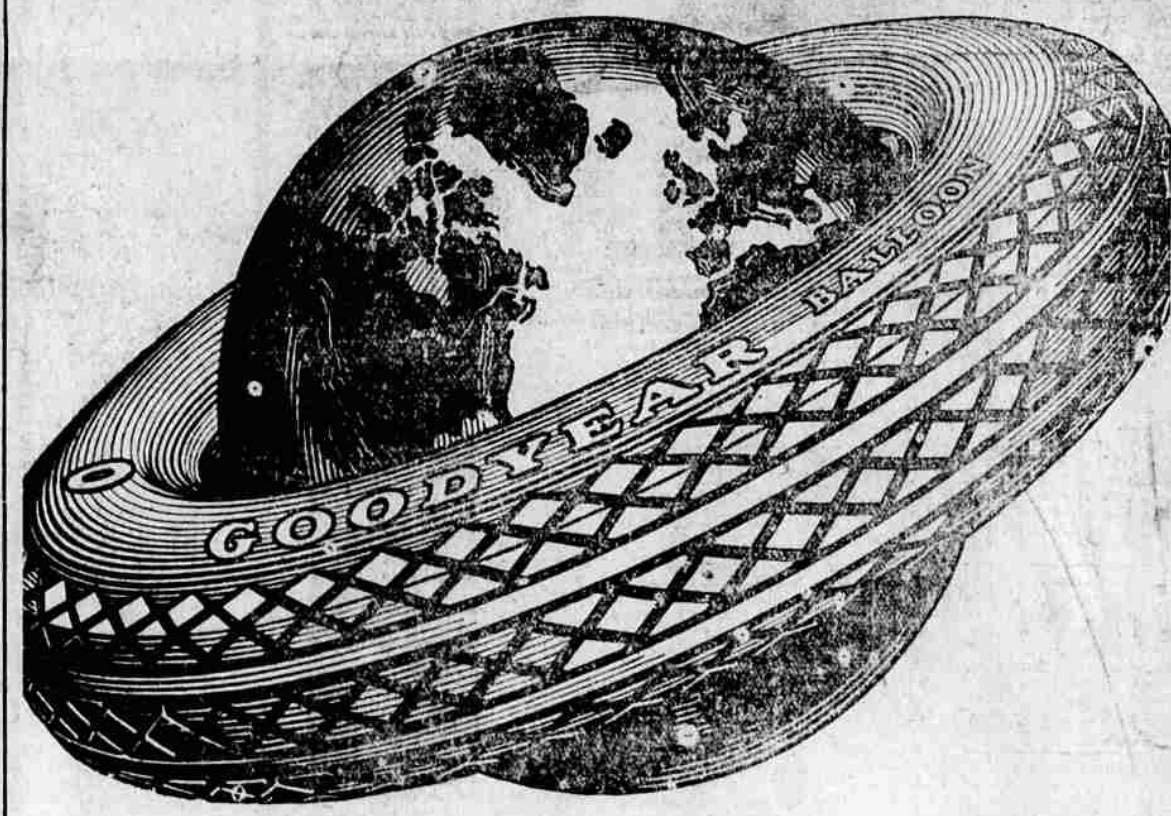
He said Marshal's temperature was 99 and that he was having the patient eat lots of mashed potatoes to get his strength back.
