Income Tax Pointers

No. 6
Of the millions of taxpayers who will file returns for the year 1928, the vast majority are entitled, in addition to the personal exemption of \$3,000 for married persons and heads of families, \$1,000 for single persons, and a \$400 credit for each dependent, to a further credit of 25 per cent of the tax on their earned net income. Correctly to determine this credit, the taxpayer first must compute the amount of tax which would be payable without the earned income credit, and from this amount of tax 25 per cent is to be deducted, the balance being the amount of tax due.

800,000 Wrecks In Year; 27,000 Lives Are Lost

CHICAGO, Feb. 9 (AP)—Eight hundred thousand automobiles accidents in the United States during 1928 cost 27,000 lives and involved an economic loss of \$350,000,000, the national safety council reported here.

Although the fatalities represent a five per cent increase over 1927, it is the lowest increase for any one year since 1926.

Chicago had the highest death rate for the year—28.8 for each 100,000 population. St. Louis was second highest with 25.5.

Severe weather with resulting poor ventilation in homes was held responsible for deaths by asphyxiation constituting the major portion of the 2,000 home accident fatalities during December. Forty per cent of the victims were 35 years old and over.

DE PALMA MAY MEET SEGRAVE
Ralph De Palma has been invited by J. M. White, Philadelphia sportsman, to handle his record-breaking Triple speed creation at the Daytona Beach tournament in March. He would drive the same car that Ray Keech sped over the sands to a new world record of 20.52 miles an hour in April last year. White is making refinements on the car and predicts possible attainment of a speed close to 250 miles an hour.

"Wedding March" Featured At Arcade 4 Days

Increasing murmurs of huge crowds, the halloping of approaching horses, the singing of birds in an apple orchard, the cheers of a multitude inspired by a magnificent spectacle, all these sounds are brought directly to motion picture audiences in "The Wedding March" the Erich von Stroheim picture which will show at the Arcade theater for four days, starting Sunday.

"Dancing Vienna" Opens At Star On Sunday
First National's production, "Dancing Vienna," which comes to the Star theater on Sunday has a musical romance as its theme, the opposition between the old and the new schools of music as represented by the waltz and jazz. Mimi Zisky, young Viennese contralto, is the exponent of the waltz, while Johnny Konzani, hornist New York, is the devotee of jazz and the saxophone. The clash in the kind of music they love finds no echo in the love they feel for each other.

But there is enmity between the Konzani and the Zisky families and the elder Konzani arrives in Vienna to break off the love affair between his son and the granddaughter of his enemies. His plottings might have succeeded save for the power and charm of the waltz. Youthful Mimi has such a resounding triumph as she dances the waltz in her first appearance in a revue, that the hostile families are charmed into forgetting their differences. The waltz triumphs over jazz and over old enemies.

Ben Lyon, popular and handsome young American leading man, and Lya Mara, beautiful dancer and screen actress with an international reputation, play the leads, while Arnold Korff is the boy's father and Julius Falkenstein and Olga Engel are the girl's grandparents.

HEALTH
PNEUMONIA

Pneumonia strikes down the robust nearly as readily as the feeble. Following an influenza epidemic there is usually an increase in the number of deaths from pneumonia. In 1926 pneumonia caused 875 deaths, and in 1927, 814 deaths. This is a greater toll than that demanded by pulmonary tuberculosis. Pneumonia is caused by the Diplococcus pneumoniae. There are four types of this germ. The difference is not in their shapes but in their serological properties. There is a therapeutic serum for Type 1. This serum must be given early to be effective.

The way to prevent pneumonia is to avoid as much as possible the sneezers, coughers and spitters who are unconsciously scattering germs. The most powerful factors in the prevention of pneumonia are adequate ventilation in sleeping rooms, sufficient blankets, dry feet, good nutrition, carefully graduated exercise and work, and an opportunity for rest under hygienic conditions.

Pneumonia is due to an infection of an individual with a virulent organism from another individual. It is, therefore, important to insist upon the isolation of all pneumonia cases. The virulent pneumococcus should not be regarded as a normal inhabitant of the mouth, throat and nose. Because this germ is frequently found there, is no reason for not taking due precautions. Each case of pneumonia should be considered very much as an attack of whooping cough and influenza; an infection which is spread from man to man through the secretions of the mouth and nose.

pneumonia will diminish the number of carriers. Pneumonia must be regarded as a communicable disease which can be prevented to a large extent by insuring a proper control over such cases. In some localities all cases of pneumonia are quarantined. In Pittsburgh, for instance, the incidence of pneumonia was reduced by quarantining all cases.
