PORTLAND, Feb. 11 (AP)—After two asserted attempts to shift responsibility onto other persons, John M. Steel admitted today that he drove the automobile which caused injury to five persons in a head-on collision here last night. He was fined \$100, sentenced to jail for 40 days and his driver's license was suspended for one year. Driving while drunk was the charge.

18 INJURED  
SEATTLE, Feb. 11 (AP)—Eighteen persons were injured, four seriously when a motor stage skid-

ded on the icy pavement into a street car here shortly before midnight.

The bus, northbound from Auburn, swerved to avoid striking an automobile, but it skidded into the automobile and then tumbled into the street car.

Two of the bus passengers were possibly fatally injured. They are Ed L. Quigley, who was injured internally, and A. Sahke Mashki, who suffered a fractured skull and internal injuries. Both live in Seattle.
