## Income Tax Pointers

No. 7

Under the revenue act of 1928 the maximum amount which may be claimed as earned income tax credit is increased from \$20,000 to \$30,000. To claim this credit on the tax due on net income in excess of \$5,000, the income must be earned by the taxpayer as wages, salaries, professional fees, and other amounts received as compensation for personal services.

The tax on an earned income of \$20,000 is computed in the case of a married person, without dependents, as follows:

Net income	\$20,000.00
Less personal exemption	3,000.00
Balance taxable	\$17,000.00
1 1/2 per cent tax on first \$4,000	60.00
3 per cent tax on second \$4,000	120.00
5 per cent tax on remaining \$18,000	925.00
Surtax on net income of \$20,000	880.00
Total normal and surtax	1,985.00
Less 2 1/2 per cent of \$1,985 earned income credit	496.25
Balance of tax payable	1,488.75

A taxpayer may have earned during the year a salary of \$100,000 or more, but the 2 1/2 per cent credit applies only to \$30,000 of such amount.

## Stroheim's "Wedding March" At The Arcade

What is believed by Paramount studio executives and hundreds of reviewers to be one of the most pretentious screen products of the season is offered to Arcade theater patrons when Erich von Stroheim's production "The Wedding March," which opened Sunday for a four-day run.

The filming of the picture consumed more than six months of concentrated effort and the result has been a picture of Vienna life in story, color and sound.

The sequences told in and before the great St. Stephen's cathedral in Vienna during the celebration of Corpus Christi required the assistance of more than 2,100 persons and resulted in scenes of the utmost magnificence. These sequences are reproduced on the screen in colors of rare beauty and with the new Paramount sound effects, the whole combines to produce an unusually interesting and inspiring portrayal.

The hundreds of uniforms worn by the mounted soldiers were actually secured in Vienna and are the original costumes worn by members of the famous Mounted Guards regiment. In the coronation sequence, the carriage occupied by the late Emperor Franz Josef, imported from Austria in spite of united opposition on the part of loyal Austrians, is used.

The sound effects accompany the action throughout the picture to add to the realism and beauty of the story.

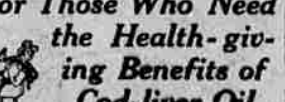
