## UNION COUNCIL ADOPTS NEW PLAN

### Water Rent to Be Paid for in Advance; to Discontinue Tourist Camp

UNION, Ore. (Special)—The new city council has inaugurated a change in regard to water rent. Union has a flat rate for each month and no meters are used, so in the past the prompt payment of water rent has been somewhat neglected. Last year a collector was appointed and now this city will follow the system used in La Grande and other places. Water rent to be paid by the 15th of each month in advance. D. H. Crouter is the new city recorder, at whose office the monthly stipend is to be paid. Another change which the present council has decided on is the discontinuance of the municipal tourist camp ground adjoining the city park. The buildings which were for the special use of the campers will be disposed of and the matter of entertaining the tourists left to private enterprise. Union now has one other camp ground, the one at Goodbrod lake, with cottages, a small store, boats on the lake and other conveniences for the tourist.

Messrs. Adkins, Lay and Van Tress will handle the rural and cow mail from the Junction and out of Union, are having their share of hardships these days. Teams of horses, sleds, two days to make a one-day trip, impassable snow-banks and even teams running away are some of the uninviting features of handling Uncle Sam's work, which have been falling to the lot of these men.

apple dumplings, milk, coffee. Coffee pie forms a labor-saving "one-piece" meal that is novel and appetizing. Freshened codfish, potatoes, parsnips and tomatoes are combined and cooked en-cas-crole in a most appetizing fashion.

Scalloped Ham and Celery  
One cup finely chopped cooked ham, 1 cup diced parboiled celery, ½ cup grated cheese, 1 teaspoon paprika, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1½ cups milk, ¼ teaspoon salt.  
Melt butter, stir in flour and slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Bring to the boiling point and add salt. Put alternate layers of ham, celery and sauce into a well-buttered baking dish, making the last layer of sauce. Cover with cheese and sprinkle with paprika. Put into a moderately hot oven to heat thoroughly and melt the cheese. Serve from baking dish.  
This is an excellent way to use up scraps of ham and the coarse outer stalks of celery.
