At a time when careers for women were undreamed of she served her apprenticeship as a type setter, and for 40 years of her life, journalism was her work. She also taught school for 11 years and for the last 14 years she has been librarian at Cove. The remarkable thing is not so much the fact of her having done these things, but that she is still very active and doing her work in a very creditable manner. At 85 she still takes the same interest in the Baptist church of which she has been a member for 70 years, and in the Eastern Star and Rebekah degree of the Odd Fellows, which she did when she joined them. Apple Secret

"The secret of growing apples," says W. H. Furman, Imbler apple grower, who is in town today, "is first class cultivation, two good sprays a season and thinning the apples from eight to ten inches apart." Mr. Furman expects to ship 40 carloads of apples from his orchard during the 1929 season. He has 105 acres.

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is made possible because of the keen demand for his appearance. He takes a staff of electricians, etc. with him and presents pictures and a travelogue in connection with the eastern lectures.

Often Speaks to 5,000

Mr. Riley's audiences average from 200 to 5,000 and his lectures are bringing tremendous results in tourists. He explains to them that the Pacific Northwest and its wonders is the joint property of the east and west and inculcates in them the desire to see "their possessions." Ordinarily Mr. Riley visits 100 cities in probably 25 states on one tour.

Speaking of Oregon, Mr. Riley said "Oregon is a sort of a Cinderella—charming and fair but not yet discovered by the prince." In his spreading of the gospel of the Northwest he uses diplomacy and the high-pressure, sometimes antagonistic attacks that have often of the high-pressure, sometimes antagonistic.

East Oregon Has Much to Offer

Mr. Riley was agreeably surprised to find such splendid hotel accommodations in La Grande and he asserts that Eastern Oregon has much to offer easterners in addition to the Wallawa Wonderland and its majestic scenery. Western Oregon and Portland are more like the east, he said, but in Eastern Oregon the visitor can find the cowboy, the miner, the shepherd and the great open spaces he expects to encounter. Commenting on the attitude many easterners have, he said that so-called world travelers, who know Europe thoroughly, have reached 60 years of age without spending a night in a Pullman car. Chicago is the Northwest to the east and the Pacific Northwest is so far away they hardly comprehend its existence, he said. This morning Mr. Riley praised the efforts of the chamber of com-

merce highly in securing such a large crowd for tonight's dinner. All dinner reservations have been sold. The dinner begins at 8:45 o'clock and those who have no reservations for the dinner are invited to hear his address, which will begin about 8 o'clock. Among the musical features tonight will be the La Grande municipal band.
