PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 12 (AP)—In the absence of a meeting of the Portland dairy exchange Tuesday because of the Lincoln birthday holiday, egg and butter prices remained at Monday's levels.

Butter is in good demand and no easing up in price is expected. Egg supplies are becoming larger with moderate weather and the price tendency is anything but firm.

NEW YORK, Feb. 12 (AP)—Frequent shifts of speculative sentiment in today's stock market testified to the nervousness prevailing in professional quarters as a result of recent adverse credit developments. The market opened with a surprising outburst of strength, turned reactionary around noon and then darted upward again in the early afternoon when the call money rate was lowered from 7 1/2 to 6 per cent.

Bulls tightened their grip on the market in the late trading when strength of the coppers and utilities began to have a more general effect upon the remainder of the list. Anaconda Copper touched 15 1/2. Adams Express jumped 3 1/2 points and gains of 4 and 5 points were made by International Com. and Light, American Water Power, American Snuff, and Wesson Oil, the closing tone was firm.

Sales approximated 4,300,000 shares.

**Radio Reception**

**DETROIT'S MONEY MARKET**  
**OLDEST DISTRICT OF CITY**

DETROIT (AP)—Detroit's financial district is as old as the city itself. When Antoine de La Mothe Cadillac founded the original settlement of "The Ford" in 1701 he centered it around what now is Griswold street.

Today Griswold street still is the financial center, although it has reached out somewhat to include several other squares. Yet the expansion in the main has been upward. Near completion are the new Penobscot and Union Trust buildings, pushing their summits 41 and 42 stories into the air. In the old First National building in which the Detroit stock exchange is housed.

The exchange was founded in 1897 and originally was called the Detroit Traders' association. A few years later, when it became an incorporated exchange, its sponsors patterned the constitution after that of the New York stock exchange. In 1914 the organization took on the aspect of a regular exchange, after growing demands upon its facilities had kept it moving from one building to another seeking adequate space to transact its business.
