long enough to brown them slightly. Garnish chops with thick slices of orange sprinkled with minced parsley, and serve.

Casserole of Spaghetti
One cup broken spaghetti, 2 slices fat salt pork, 1 medium-sized carrot, 1 onion, 1 sweet green pepper, 2 stalks celery, 6 mushrooms (optional), 4 pound round steak, 1 cup strained tomatoes, 1 teaspoon sugar, 4 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 cup fine stale bread crumbs, 1/4 cup grated cheese.

Cook spaghetti in boiling salted water until tender. Drain and rinse in cold water. Put half of it in a smooth layer in a casserole. Put salt pork through food chopper and cook in a hot frying pan until fat has cooked out and pork has begun to brown. Put carrot, onion, pepper with seeds and pith removed, celery, mushrooms and meat through food chopper and add to pork and fat in frying pan. Cook until vegetables begin to brown and add tomatoes, sugar and pepper.

Mix well and spread over spaghetti in casserole. Cover with remaining spaghetti and sprinkle top with cheese and bread crumbs thoroughly mixed. Put into a moderate oven and bake until cheese melts and top is brown. Serve from casserole. (Copyright, 1929, NEA Service, Inc.)

Disabled Ship Abandoned; Last Man Taken Off

SEATTLE, Feb. 15 (AP)—A radio message to the Associated Press at 2:50 o'clock this morning said the disabled freighter Allovay was again a floating derelict unmanned and a danger to navigation in North Pacific waters in the vicinity of Unimak Pass, Aleutian Islands. The vessel was enshrouded in a black fog when the crew members of the coast guard cutter Chelan, which had her in tow, parted, and coast guardsmen at a late hour had been unable to locate her. Naval authorities broadcast the danger to all shipping.

With the rescue of the fifty ninth man whose life was threatened by a turbulent Alaskan gale, the final act of a drama of the North Pacific in which the crews of two ships were forced to abandon their craft has been written. The fifty ninth man was James L. Polsey, oiler and stoker of the freighter Allovay, who once refused to be rescued. He was taken off the ship, of which he had been the sole occupant for two days, by a surf boat of the Chelan last night.

DINNER—Planked lamb chops, spinach and egg timbales, kumquat salad, Washington cream pie, milk, coffee.
