Income Tax Pointers

Salaries paid employees constitutes one of the largest items of business expense, which are deductible from gross income. To be allowed such claims must conform closely to the words of the revenue act of 1928, which provides for the deduction of "a reasonable allowance for personal services actually rendered." The test of deductibility is whether the amounts paid are reasonable and whether they are, in fact, purely for personal services. Money paid an officer of a corporation for which no services, or services inadequate to the compensation are rendered, is not deductible as salary. Reasonable compensation is held to be an amount that ordinarily is paid like enterprises in like circumstances for like services. For example, an officer of a corporation received in 1928 compensation in excess of the amount ordinarily paid for services such as he rendered, and which bore a relationship to the amount of his stock holdings. The excess would not be treated as salary, but as a distribution of earnings of the corporation and the amount of such excess would not be considered a deductible item.

AT THE THEATERS

"Celebrity" Is Sunday Feature At The Star

That stage plays which ruled supreme in the theatrical season of 1927-28 will dominate next year's film entertainment in their screen versions. Is the prediction of Tay Garnett, director of "Celebrity," a new Pathe production, which comes to the Star theatre on Sunday.

"Celebrity," "Broadway," "Expense Account," "Show Girl" and "Show Folks" are among the successful back stage plays, which film producers filmed in 1928. With Lina Basquette, Robert Armstrong and Clyde Cook in featured roles, "Celebrity" tells the inside story of the activities of a world's champion prize fighter. Armstrong plays the "pug," repeating his successful characterizations in "Le Zet So" and "The Main Event." Cook portrays the fighter's manager, while Miss Basquette is seen as a charming entertainer.

In addition to directing "Celebrity," Garnett collaborated on its adaptation from Willard Keefe's successful stage play of the same name. "Celebrity" is said to present a brand new slant on the prize fight story, with the winning of a big fight incidental to the action, but not the high point in the production.
