Judge Littlefield Dies in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 18—(AP)—Judge Edwin V. Littlefield, 56, of the law firm of Joseph, Haney and Littlefield, died at the breakfast table at his home here this morning. He had apparently been in excellent health.

Judge Littlefield's boyhood was spent in McMinnville. He was graduated from LaFayette seminary in 1892, and for several years was a country school teacher in various Yamhill county districts. Later he was principal of a McMinnville school, and from 1906 to 1926 was county superintendent of Yamhill.

After studying law, Littlefield practiced in McMinnville for two years and then moved to Moro, Oregon. When a new circuit court district was formed in central Oregon, Governor Chamberlain appointed Mr. Littlefield to the bench. He was elected for another term but resigned in 1929 to move to Portland.

Alma Rubens Is Out of Hospital

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 18—(AP)—Alma Rubens, film actress described as in a serious condition from a nervous breakdown and excessive use of narcotics, today was out of the Hollywood hospital and recuperating in her home, from an operation. Simultaneously state and federal officials renewed their investigations into the alleged illegal prescribing of the narcotics for her.

Miss Rubens was removed to her home late yesterday from the hospital where last week she underwent an operation. The nature of this was not disclosed, but following it her condition had been reported as critical. Previously she had been confined to a sanitarium for treatment of her disordered condition. Dr. L. James Gibson, Beverly Hills physician, is the only one of eight physicians being investigated for their alleged illegal activities in prescribing narcotics.

Gridiron Rule Makes Fumbles Less Dangerous

NEW YORK, Feb. 18—(AP)—Adoption of a radical new gridiron rule, making fumbled balls dead at the point of recovery, when recovered by the defensive team, was announced today by the national football rules committee as the chief result of a two-day secret session.

The committee's decision, which approves a recommendation having the widespread support of football coaches, was made public by W. S. Langford, secretary.

"The new rule," said a formal statement, "will not apply in case of forward passing nor to backward passes which are intercepted before striking the ground nor will it apply to blocked kicks which will be played as heretofore."


