Income Tax Pointers

No. 11

In making out their income tax returns for the year 1928 taxpayers are advised by the Bureau of Internal Revenue carefully to present their claims with regard to deductions for losses. To be allowed such claims must conform closely to the wording of the statute. Losses are deductible if incurred in a taxpayer's trade or business, and any transaction entered into for profit, though not connected with the taxpayer's trade or business, or if arising from fires, storms, shipwreck, or other casualty, or by theft and if not compensated for by insurance or otherwise.

Business losses result, usually, from the purchase and sale of merchandise. Such losses are ascertained by means of inventories which are required whenever, in the opinion of the commissioner of internal revenue, their use is necessary to determine the income of any taxpayer.

"Alias Jimmy Valentine" Is Great Comedy

The greatest trio of laugh-makers that ever combined to give an audience hysterics.

That is the work of William Haines, Karl Dane and Tully Marshall in Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's famous picture of laughter and tears, "Alias Jimmy Valentine," which, with talking sequences, is now playing at the Arcade theater.

The screen has brought many famous comedians and several famous picture-goers but it has never before brought together a screen trio that make light the heart of America as do these three laugh-getters.

Haines, of course, plays the role of the smart sophisticated bank burglar who twits the police of jail a dozen times and escapes unhurt from their attempts to convict him. As associates he has Dane as the dumb co-worker, the "outside" man who watches the approach of danger and Marshall as the inside man who handles the tools and generally makes himself useful.

However the greatest part of the picture is not concerned with crime but with the efforts of the three criminals to turn themselves into respectable members of society in the small town where they "hide out" after pulling a big job.

The scenes where they attend church, visit the police chief, and are invited to dinner by the banker, their intent robbing, touch new highlights of comedy.

These scenes were made by the use of a novel mechanical device which enabled Harry Beaumont, the director, to follow the players throughout the action and catch them in the water through a petri-cope lens.

"A Single Man" is a filmation of the famous stage play by Hubert Henry Davies. It was adapted for the screen by F. Hugh Herbert and George O'Hara.

Included in the stellar supporting cast are Kathryn Williams, Eileen Manning and others.

The story concerns a burlesque novelist and a prize but beautiful secretary to whom he turns for affection when he realizes that chasing flappers is a tiresome pastime for a middle-aged worldling.

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
