## Claire Windsor And McLaglen In "Captain Lash"

"Captain Lash" is in town, stopping at the Star theater, where, at many intervals, and for more than an hour at a time, he is to provide some real live-making and some thrilling two-handed knock-down, drag-out fighting all this week.

"Captain Lash" is Fox Film's newest starring production for Victor McLaglen, of "What Price Glory?" fame, and it is a whole of a picture.

McLaglen, in the name part, is called "Captain Lash" because he drives his men in the stock hole of an ocean liner like a human whip. Off duty he is a gay Romeo or a fighter as the mood seizes him.

As usual, a girl—Claire Windsor—gets him in her power, and thus into a series of exciting situations from which he finds it hard to extricate himself.

Miss Windsor furnishes the feminine pulchritude, and some mighty good acting. Comedy moments are many when "Cocky" (Clyde Cook) and his conceit combine to save Lash from trouble.

## "White Shadows In South Seas" Now Playing

## Income Tax Pointers

No. 16  
The cost of capital assets, less adjustment for depreciation and salvage may be deducted from gross income if their usefulness suddenly is terminated and they are disposed of. For example, a manufacturer may be compelled to scrap machinery because it has become inadequate or obsolete. He may deduct the loss sustained, if he has sold, abandoned, or otherwise permanently parted with the machinery. Such loss must be charged off on the books of the taxpayer and fully explained in his income-tax return.

If a taxpayer demolishes a building used in his trade or business and replaces it he may deduct the loss sustained, but if he buys, on the site of a new building, land upon which is located an old building, demolition of the old building is not considered a loss and therefore is not deductible. The value of real estate, exclusive of the old improvements, is presumed to be equal to the purchase price of the land and building, plus the cost of converting the useless building.
