The Junior Red Cross is doing very notable work in translating and sending the various letters and portfolios to and from countries all over the world. The aim of this organization is two-fold. First, to promote friendship between the children of different countries with a view eventually to prevent war and second to bring out the fine characteristics of the nations corresponding.

The portfolio now in exhibit consists chiefly of beautiful original embroidery designs done by the two classes of boys, also of views of the three chief cities, Praha (Prague), Bratislava and Brno (Brunn), and pictures of three classes of the higher elementary grades of boys and girls. The designs tend to show how far the technique of the boys and girls has advanced. Designs painted by Czechoslovakian boys and girls in the seventh and eighth grades are used on crochery all over the world.

While America would fall "disgracefully" in its mission in the world, if it did not defend its own independence, sovereignty and other inalienable rights, he added, it would fall also if it did not respect them in others.

"So long as we continue as a nation," the president went on, "both foreign and domestic affairs will constantly produce new questions for consideration." He added that there was no cause for alarm in the fact that at present "there are subjects requiring diplomatic adjustment," declaring that there are more methods by which the certainty increases that they will be composed.
