### Call Money Up And Stocks Go Down in Street

NEW YORK, Feb. 25 (AP)—Marking up of the call money rate from 6 1/2 to 8 per cent turned the course of stock prices reactionary today after an opening of strength. Early gains of 1 to 11 points were substantially cut down or wiped out and a long list of issues sank 1 to 5 points below last week's final quotations. Trading, which was fairly brisk in the early rally, turned dull on the decline.

The line of least resistance in the late trading appeared to be downward in spite of strenuous efforts to force the rally under leadership of U. S. Steel, which again got up to around its best figure of the day on a large turn over. Missouri Pacific established a new high point when it touched 77 1/2 and Otis Elevator jumped 1 1/2 points.

A number of speculative favorites continued to slip down a point or so. The closing tone was irregular.

Sales approximated 3,450,000 shares.
