Print And Reprint In Spring Fashions

By Diana Merwin (Associated Press Fashion Editor) PARIS (AP)—How far the vogue for prints goes this summer is up to the ladies.

Paris shows them and Paris lets them alone. You choose your dressmaker accordingly in rarified Rue de la Paix and Champs Elysee clothes circles.

While there are prints a-plenty among the new spring and summer styles, they are nearly all less ebullient and less aggressive than those which preceded them. Small designs, subdued pastels colors on light grounds and sober rich shades on dark grounds are the 1929 summer version. On the other hand, prints have spread into even apparel on the informal natural colored shantung and surahs, which promise to be one of the distinguishing styles of the summer.

MENUS

By Sister Mary BREAKFAST—Coddled apples, cereal, cream, eggs poached in tomato sauce, toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Lentil vegetable soup, banana and peanut salad, raisin brown bread, lemon meringue pie, milk, tea.

DINNER—Baked fish, creamed noodles, spinach and egg timbales, apricot jelly with whipped cream, milk, tea.

Dip fish into highly salted hot milk and then roll them in dried bread crumbs. This forms a coating over the fish which prevents the escape of the delicately flavored juices. Put the prepared fish in an oiled baking pan and sprinkle over them a tablespoonful of oil for each pound of fish. Bake in a very hot oven for 10 or 12 minutes. This is an excellent way to cook fish since it requires no turning and the fish is easily lifted out of the baking pan to a hot platter without breaking.

Lentil Vegetable Soup One cup dried carrots, 3/4 cup dried turnips, 1/2 cup thinly sliced onion, 2 cups chopped spinach, 1 thinly sliced peak, 1 cup thinly sliced celery root, 4 tablespoons butter, 4 cups milk, 2 cups canned tomatoes, 1/4 teaspoon soda, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper.

Melt butter and add prepared vegetables. Shake well until vegetables are well coated with butter. Cover closely and cook over a low fire for 15 minutes. Stir occasionally to prevent burning. Rub tomatoes through a coarse sieve to remove seeds and add soda to puree. Stir well and add to hot milk thickened with flour stirred to a smooth paste with a little cold milk. Add vegetables and let simmer for 45 minutes. Season with salt and pepper and force through a colander. Reheat and serve with grated cheese. (Copyright, 1929, NEA Service, Inc.)
