Income Tax Pointers

No. 21

Deductions for depreciation form an important item in the returns of many taxpayers and are the subject of frequent inquiry. The revenue act of 1928 provides "a reasonable allowance for the exhaustion, wear, and tear of property used in the trade or business, including a reasonable allowance for obsolescence." For convenience, such allowance usually is referred to by regulations relating to the income tax as depreciation.

In claiming a deduction for depreciation several fundamental principles must be observed. The deduction must be confined to property actually used in the trade, business, profession, or vocation. In general, it applies to the taxpayer's capital assets—buildings, machinery, etc.—the cost of which can not be deducted as a business expense. A building or machinery gradually becomes old and worn out. On account of this depreciation the value of such assets is decreased. Loss is thereby sustained for which the taxpayer is entitled to recognition in making his return of income.

Indian Accused Of Murder Of White

PORTLAND, Feb. 27 (AP)—Charged with the murder of William L. Ward, white, Perry John, Klamath Indian, was indicted by the federal grand jury here late Monday and ordered held for trial on a first-degree murder count. The grand jury heard testimony indicating John had killed Ward with a knife at Chillicothe on February 7, last.

The killing was preceded by a drunken brawl in which Ward, John and an Indian woman figured.

These men have an attachment for the uniforms in which they endured many hardships and participated in numerous lavish spectacles. Every one of them entered the spirit of the picture and recreated the old Russia under the czar followed by those stirring days when the Reds assumed control.

Every uniform in the picture is not only authentic but has actually seen service in scenes similar to those visualized upon the screen.

"The Scarlet Lady" was made under the direction of Alan Crosland. Lya de Pazzi, Don Alvarado and Warner Oland have the featured roles.
