NEW YORK, Feb. 27 (AP)—An easier undertone in the call money market and a grist of favorable trade news and earnings reports provided the back ground for an extensive advance in prices in today's stock market. A few specialties were marked up 6 to 25 points on pool manipulation, and a long list of standard industrials sold 1 to 5 points above yesterday's final quotations. Trading was fairly heavy.

E. S. Steel was down to around 18 1/2 in the final hour, but most of the other representative shares continued to make decided upward progress. Allied Chemical was up 9 points as it got into new high ground above 300. J. J. Manville rose 8 points and Radio, old, mounted 15 points above its early low. Curtiss Wright, Packard, Byers and Goodyear rubbers were lifted 4 and 5 points. The closing tone was strong. Sales approximated 4,000,000 shares.
