Library Chats

It should be a simple matter now to tell whether a book will circulate or not. According to Mr. Haldeman-Julius, who has sold over 100,000,000 copies of his "little blue books" during the last ten years, there are three subjects of universal interest:

1. Sex.
2. Self Improvement.
3. Attacks upon respectability and religion.

Any book that fails to sell at least 10,000 copies a year in Mr. Haldeman-Julius' series of cheap reprints is sent to his book hospital, where its commercial defects are analyzed. If they are in the text, the book is dropped; if in the title, this is ruthlessly altered. He also says this method works. In 1924 for example, a translation of Victor Hugo's "Le Roi s'Amuse" sold only 5,000 copies under its own title; in 1927, under its revised title of "The Lascivious King Enjoys Himself," it sold 28,000. Quincy's "Essay on Conversation" under the title of "How to Improve Your Conversation," sells like hotcakes.

Here are several new titles which should circulate regardless of whether they meet Mr. Haldeman-Julius' requirements for circulating qualities or not:

The Magic Island
W. B. Seabrook

This book is still a best seller in Portland. A book about Haiti, that island of Black Magic, four days off our Atlantic Coast, peopled and civilized by the descendants of negro slaves. Mr. Seabrook went to Haiti because, though he had traveled over half the world, he sensed its mystery.

Bosphorus Mouth Choked With Ice

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 28 (AP)—For the first time in more than a hundred years the mouth of the Bosphorus is almost impassable because of icebergs and ice-floes which have floated down from the Black sea.

Turkish vessels arriving here from the Black sea after cutting a channel through the floating ice report that many icebergs are floating southward. One floe was said to be seven miles long. The sudden springlike warmth which has come to Constantinople after the terrific cold of the past two weeks is expected to melt the obstructions shortly.

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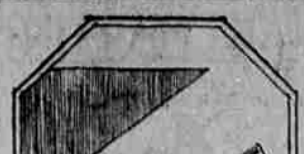
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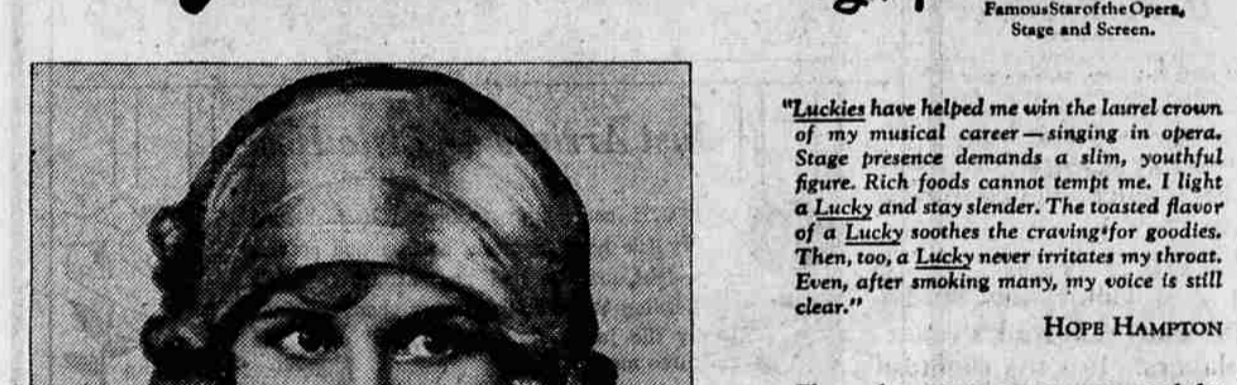
