Large Land Deal In Umatilla County

PENDLETON, Mar. 1.—The largest individual land deal ever consummated in Umatilla county is announced here in the purchase, at a cost of nearly a million dollars, of extensive farm holdings from Carl C. Perringer. Purchase is made by Henry W. Collins, of Pendleton, and Harry Hanfield, of Portland, who have bought at a cost of three-quarters of a million dollars all of the land with the exception of a half section which has been bought by J. W. Maloney. The exact acreage purchased by Mr. Collins and Mr. Hanfield is not announced, but it includes all the land of the Perringer ranches with the exception of that bought by Mr. Maloney. All is rich reservation wheat land under cultivation, and known as one of the best wheat ranches in the entire Northwest. About half the land is in crop and this year's crop goes to the new owners. Farm buildings and farm equipment are included in the sale.

POULTRY MEN HAVE DAY AT CONFERENCE

(Continued from Page 1) occupation at once." Then Mr. Souder pointed out that in the cost figure there were included labor for all the time spent, 5 per cent on the money invested and 5 per cent for depreciation. This, he declared, put the poultry industry where it belonged, rightfully, as a business proposition. Yesterday Afternoon C. L. Long, horticultural specialist, continued the discussion yesterday afternoon of the soil improvement problem in orchards. He asserted that better soil was organic and urged the use of bulky organic matter as fertilizers, such as alfalfa, the vetches and straw, with a supplement of commercial fertilizers. He concluded with a careful discussion of the last named—the commercial fertilizers. All through his consideration of the subject, Mr. Long stressed the necessity of frequent cultivation. Leifey Childs, head of the Hood River experiment station, dealt with the subject of diseases and insects which are bothering the fruit industry. He reported on work

being done at his station, and offered some new methods of control which are in operation there. L. R. Brethaupt concluded the afternoon with a review of some of the findings of the home market survey. It was rather disappointing that this part of the conference was not more largely attended by business men of the county. It was reported. Mr. Brethaupt explained how the survey came to be that it was financed by federal, state and local appropriations. He emphasized the importance of the project and showed by charts the way the work was put on and the mass of data accumulated. Frank McKennon, who was chairman of the committee arranging for this movement, offered the thanks of interested parties to the extension service of the college for its assistance and while he was on his feet, motions were made and put through covering a move to conserve the results of the survey. Chairmen are to be appointed for each commodity covered by the survey—apples, cherries, prunes, small fruits and vegetables. These chairmen are, in turn, to select their committees who shall go over very thoroughly the parts of the survey of interest to them. Similar committees will be chosen from among the ranks of the business men, who shall also consider these reports. After the work shall have been finished, the two groups will meet together and formulate plans for the practical use of the mass of material on hand. It was the consensus of the meeting yesterday that this would be the best plan to adopt to care for the survey and bring it into actual operation.
