Income Tax Pointers

No. 21
Inquiries received by the Bureau of Internal Revenue indicate confusion in the minds of the writers concerning the difference between business expenditures and business expenses. Business expenditures are not always business expenses and therefore deductible within the meaning of the income-tax law. A merchant may build an addition to his store at a cost of \$25,000. This is a capital expenditure for an addition to his assets. Capital expenditures are not deductible.

Medical, law, or other professional books, machinery, tools, implements, or surgical instruments purchased by a taxpayer for use in his business, trade, or profession, and which are of a permanent character, are capital expenditures and their cost is not deductible. The purchase price of an automobile, even one used wholly for business or professional purposes, is a capital expenditure and not deductible. The cost of gasoline, repairs, and upkeep of an automobile is deductible if used only in business. If used partly for business and partly for pleasure and convenience, such cost should be apportioned accordingly. The proportion of cost justly attributable for business purposes is deductible as a necessary expense.

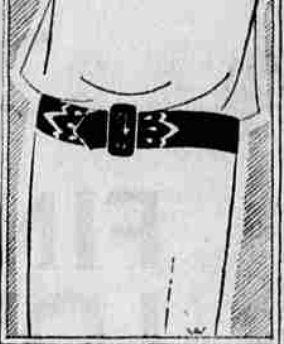
The sequences of "What a Night!" are sure-fire for thrills and laughs and are, in toto, excellent screen entertainment.

The farmer should harvest his own timber crop. He can sell his own labor and that of his teams or trucks along with the crop, just as he does when selling wheat, cotton or corn. Selling out timber products in the log, pole, tie or cord means increased money income and, if cut rightly, also leaves the woodlands in better condition for growing another timber crop. Idle land pays no interest.

A good method of feeding shorts or middlings to sows is to put the feed in a self-feeder some distance from the water supply and sleeping quarters. The rack for the alfalfa hay should be kept between the last two. If this plan of feeding middlings and hay is followed, the sows can be fed twice daily in troughs or on a feeding floor.
