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ALL EGG PRICES TOPPLING TODAY

Egg Cut Ranges from 2 to 4 cents; Butter Also Going Down

PORTLAND, Ore., March 2 (A. P.)—All egg prices toppled and two grades of butter followed with slight decline today.

Standards and prime firsts in butter lost their half cent advance of two days ago when they dropped to 44 and 42½, respectively. Standard extra eggs clipped off 2 cents at 25, standard firsts 2 cents at 27, medium extras 2 cents at 26 and medium firsts 4 cents at 25. It is the biggest crash eggs has undergone for some time. Better laying by hens is the cause. Medium size oranges are more plentiful and cheaper. The same holds true of bananas, which are selling wholesale at 6½ to 7 cents. Fresh meats and poultry prices were unchanged.

There were a number of changes in mill feed and flours, the former showing declines and the latter advancing.

Byers 6, National Cash Register 5 and Columbia Graphophone, General Electric, Anaconda Copper, Kennecott, American Smelting, Cerro de Pasco, U. S. Steel and Union Carbide sold down 2 to 4 points at one time.

The stock ticker was 12 minutes late at 11:50 a. m. The closing was irregular.
