Governor Signs State Fair Bill; Action Hastened

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 4 (AP)—The bill appropriating \$100,000 for the erection of a combined grandstand and exhibit building at the Oregon state fair grounds was signed by Governor Patterson Saturday night and filed with the secretary of state.

It was rumored that the governor hastened action because of a report that, in retaliation for a Marion county man enjoining \$5 per diem extra pay for members, the senate would on Monday recall from the executive office the executive order which authorized the bill and attempt to reconsider and defeat it. This was not confirmed.

The measure is conditioned on \$20,000 additional being raised from private sources. Both amounts are to be repaid from the proceeds of the fair.

The governor signed the bills introduced by Eddy, Eberhard, Schulmerich, Strayer, Butt and Brown, providing that only persons paying taxes on at least \$300 worth of property shall vote in state or municipal elections on questions of levying taxes or issuing bonds.

The governor also signed the following bills:

HB 426, by Representative Briggs and Senator Dunn—Increasing the salary of the Jackson county treasurer.

HB 447, by Hamilton—Providing for withdrawal of the waters of Tumalo creek from appropriation.

HB 489, by Collier and Hamilton—Increasing salaries of Jefferson county officers.

With the title safely taken, the Portlanders will leave Friday for Denver, Colo., and will enter the Union Pacific system winter sports program to decide the railroad championship. The hoop tournament will be held March 11, 12 and 13.

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Mar. 4 (AP)—Babe Ruth has decided that he is going to have a good year and that the New York Yankees were going to win another American league pennant.

Aside from saying that he is in good physical trim and confident that he will play as well as he ever has, the babe declined to become as specific as to why he thought so.

But he became eloquent as to the Yankees' chances.

"The other teams, Detroit and Washington, in particular may have improved," the babe says, "but not enough to threaten us. I can't see that the Athletics, who gave us the most trouble last year, are any stronger. Neither are the Browns. We are bound to get more pitching than we had last year for we will have Pennock and Moore back. And I am saying this before I've seen any of our young pitchers and I hear they are very good."

Giants Expecting Much From Rookie

BELLEHAR, Fla., Mar. 4 (AP)—A youngster from Youngstown, Ohio has stepped into the limelight of golfdom. Tommy Ricketts, 23-year-old professional is the new top pitcher by virtue of a brilliant 275 score which won the Florida west coast open championship yesterday.

Shooting steadily throughout the entire 72 hole contest, Ricketts came home two strokes under par. Three strokes behind him was his nearest rival, Billie Burke, the north and south open title holder. Louis Chiappetta of Hartford, Conn., was third with 285, far behind Ricketts.

Golden Bears Enroute Home from Seattle With Coast Championship

SEATTLE, Wash., Mar. 4 (AP)—California's Golden Bears basketball quintet were enroute home today after winning two straight games from the University of Washington Huskies to gain the Pacific coast basketball championship.

The smooth working combination from Berkeley romped away with the first game Friday night, 42 to 21. They took the second game Saturday night 23-27, the Huskies coming from behind in the last period with a real battle, but the visitors' lead was too great to overcome, California having a margin of 21 to 6, at the half.

Plans are being discussed for a merchandizing shoot to be held soon, according to Dr. McCall.
