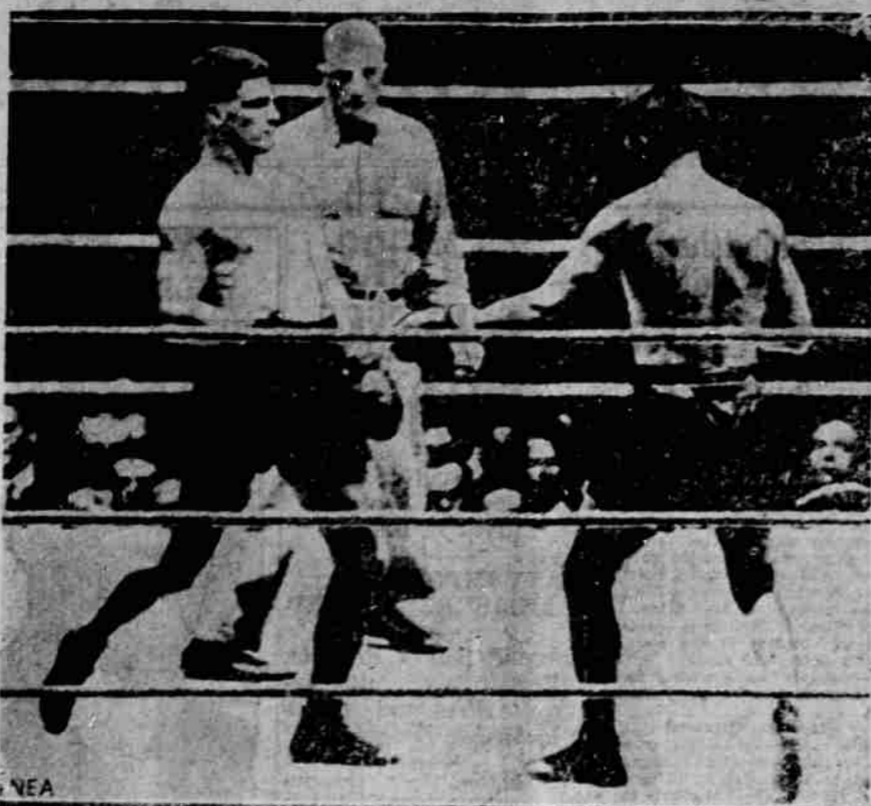

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BAKER MAY JOIN BASEBALL LEAGUE

Meeting of Fans to Be Held Thursday; Conference With La Grande

BAKER, Ore., Mar. 5—A meeting of Baker baseball fans will be held in the chamber of commerce rooms Thursday night, when the proposed formation of a league, comprising Baker, La Grande, Pendleton and Walla Walla will be discussed.

It was understood here that Pendleton and Walla Walla had entered the Oregon-Washington-Idaho league, but Louis Ott was told by three La Grande representatives last weekend that Pendleton and Walla Walla were desirous of entering a league with Baker and La Grande. A representative of the Pendleton club was en route to Pendleton to sign up with the tri-state league, but returned to Pendleton when he was given reason to believe Baker would enter a team, Ott said.

The La Grande men want to open a 24-game schedule, which would open April 14 and close September 2, Labor Day.
