Here and There In Legislature

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 5 (AP)—Governor Patterson has signed house bill 91. The bill would repeal a law which provides that in case of a vacancy occurring in the office of county clerk, the county clerk's term is filled by an appointment by the county court.

Among measures passed by the house yesterday were:
HB 131, by Anderson, Carkin and Hamilton—Providing for a limitation of bond issues in cities and towns to not more than 10 per cent of assessed valuations, except utility, improvement, and refunding bonds and bonds already authorized but not issued.

that certain funds received by state departments, not now turned over to the state treasurer, shall be turned over to that official, placed in the general fund, credited to the appropriate account and paid out on warrant of the secretary of state.

HB 593, by joint ways and means committee—Appropriating \$31,999 to pay expenses of new modification of Oregon laws.

HB 344, by Rynon—Making insanity legal grounds for divorce, if insane spouse has been adjudged insane five or more years before commencement of suit and been confined in an institution most of that time.

HB 424, by Chindgren—Providing standard grades for potatoes.

HB 415, by Anderson, Carkin and Hamilton—Allowing Multnomah county 25 per cent instead of 10 per cent of total amount raised in state by market road tax.

HB 457, by committee on game—Clarifying game code.

HB 422, by Swift—Prohibiting dogs being carried on running boards of automobiles in cities or on state highways unless caged in carriers.

Governor Patterson has signed senate bill 154, by the Jackson county delegation, which withdraws from appropriation the waters of the Rogue River below the junction of the north and south forks and prohibits the construction of dams or other obstructions in the river or its tributaries.

Other bills signed by the governor were:
HB 172, by Scott—Appropriating \$1500 for the soldiers' and sailors' commission.

HB 197, by Fisher—Appropriating money for repair of Roseburg armory.

HB 209, by Settlemier—Appropriating money for repair of Woodburn armory.

HB 174, by Winslow—Appropriating money for repair of Tillamook armory.

HB 147, by Metaker—Giving public access to records of industrial accident commission.

SB 129, by Moser—Relating to fraternal benefit societies.

SB 229, by joint committee on insurance—Providing for endorsement or riders on fire insurance policies which will cover fallen buildings.
