## Income Tax Pointers

Bad debts may be deducted from gross income in determining net income and may be treated in one of two ways, either by deduction from gross income in respect to debts ascertained to be worthless in whole or in part, or a reasonable addition to a reserve for bad debts. Permission to adopt the reserve method is limited to taxpayers having a large number of accounts where credit has been advanced to cover a considerable portion of time. It is not granted for the handling of one specific debt.

Bad debts may be deducted only for the year in which they are ascertained to be worthless and charged off the books of the taxpayer. The taxpayer should attach to his return a statement showing the propriety of any deduction claimed for bad debts. Where the supporting circumstances show that a debt is worthless and uncollectible, and that legal action, in all probability, would not result in the satisfaction of execution on a judgment, proof of these facts is sufficient of their worthlessness.
