EGGS CONTINUE IN LOWER TREND
All Grades Down One Cent; Revolt in Mexico Affects Vegetables

PORTLAND, Ore., March 6 (A. P.)—Egg prices took another tumble today indicating biddy's intention to stick to the nest for the some months to come. All grades went down one cent, standard extras at 24, fresh medium extras at 23 and medium firsts at 22.

Butter values were unchanged. The revolt in Mexico has begun to display some effect on the price of green vegetables, especially peas and tomatoes. Both were higher today. Mexican tomatoes, which have been providing the main supply, are halted at the international line.

An excellent lot of California cauliflower came on the market at 1.45 to 1.75 a crate wholesale. This was reported to be one of the finest shipments ever shipped here.

On the Matson line Wilhelmnia, due in Portland tonight, will come the first consignment of fresh Hawaiian pineapples ever shipped direct to Portland. This direct shipment is expected to lessen the price since the roundabout haul to California, necessitating a week or more of delay, will be eliminated. Lemons were up 25 cents, due to reported scarcity.

Wheat Nervous And Lower At Closing

CHICAGO, March 6 (AP)—Opening unchanged to 3/8c off. Chicago wheat later underwent a 3/8c all around. Corn and oats were also easy, with corn starting unchanged to 3/8c down, and afterward holding near to initial figures. Provisions advanced.

Wheat closed nervous 1/4 to 3/8c net lower; corn unchanged to 3/8c off; oats 3/8c to 1/2c down, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 2/8c.

Form Reversal Feature Today In Wall Street

NEW YORK, Mar. 6 (AP)—The stock market displayed another complete reversal of form today, ridding the leadership of the copper shares and their turning reactionary when the call money rate was marked up from 3 to 4 per cent. Many of the early gains of 1 to 7 points were cancelled, and a long list of issues sold 1 to 5 points under yesterday's final quotations.

Losses were largely extended in the last hour when call money mounted to 12 per cent, the highest since January 2nd, such representative issues as U. S. Steel, General Motors and General Electric turned heavy. Adams Express dropped 35 points to 515 and Radio (old) extended its loss to 18 points, touching 370. Among issues losing 5 to 6 points were Allis Chalmers, Delaware and Hudson, Packard, Chrysler, Western Union, Electric Auto and Union Carbide. The closing was heavy. Total sales approximated \$400,000,000 shares.

Senate to exercise two peremptory challenges and the state one, so alternating until the peremptory challenges shall have been exhausted.

S. B. 220, by Marks—Providing that in actions at law the defense may issue as many summons as it desires and deliver an original summons to the sheriff of any county.

S. B. 221, by Marks—Relating to manner of serving summons.

S. B. 222, by committee on Industries—Changing name of bureau of labor statistics and inspector of factories and workshops to "state bureau of labor."

S. B. 82—Authorizing the issuance of bonds for the construction of dormitories at the University of Oregon, Oregon State college and the state normal schools, the bonds to be retired from the proceeds of student rentals. The bonds are not state obligations. The act is largely in the interest of the normal school at Monmouth, where the city has an option on property which it is prepared to turn over to the school as the location of a dormitory.

BYRD VESSEL DOCKS AFTER HEAVY STORMS

WELLINGTON, N. Z., Mar. 6 (AP)—Commander Richard E. Byrd's supply ship, the Eleanor Bolling has arrived at Dunedin bearing traces of terrific storms she encountered when 1,200 miles south of New Zealand on her way back to the ice barrier with supplies. It was at this point that Commander Byrd ordered her to return with her cargo to New Zealand.

The base ship, the City of New York, is expected on Monday and both vessels will lay up at Dunedin for the winter.
