

CARDINALS PLAY ATHLETICS TODAY

Major League Teams Begin Exhibition Games in Training Camps

AVON PARK, Fla., Mar. 7 (AP)—Three rookies were to do mound duty for the St. Louis Cardinals today when the season's exhibition lid is lifted with the Philadelphia Athletics. Richard Cochran, Steve Byrge and Clarence Hulse will get the call.

In announcing his lineup, Manager Billy Southworth said he wanted the young shortstop, Charles Gilbert, to start as inauspiciously as possible, hence would place him seventh in the batting order. Doubt in center will be first followed by Seip, who will play second. Next comes High at third; Koetter in right; Bottomley at first; Holm in left; Wilson and Smith will catch.

New York with Mrs. Heydler. The Phillies are the first team he has seen in camp this year. He made no predictions concerning the league race, but said the Phils "looked attractive."

ATHLETICS TO PLAY
FORT MYERS, Fla., Mar. 7 (AP)—Manager Connie Mack took personal charge of the Athletics today when a squad of 19 players set off for Avon Park for the opening game of the season with the St. Louis Nationals. He announced the following starting lineup: Orwoll, first; Dykes, second; Cochran, catcher; Simmons, left; Fox, third; Haas, center; Miller, right; Haesler, shortstop; Yerkes, Brock, center field; Walberg, pitchers. A half dozen others, Mack said, would get into the game.

AVALON, Catalina Island, Cal., Mar. 7 (AP)—Porce "Pat" Malone, burly speed ball artist, appears fit and ready for the Catalina National league tournament drive. Malone was the leading ace for the "Catalinas" again yesterday as they defeated the "Avalons" 7 to 3, to win the camp baseball championship. His speed was dazzling and his control had a mid-season aspect.

ROVERS HORNBY, Clyde Beck and Earl Graves, rookie catcher, did most of the hitting for the "Catalinas," while Kiki Cuyler wielded a heavy bat for the "Avalons," who have lost two out of the three games.

OHLAND, Fla., Mar. 7 (AP)—Admiral League, the eminent right hander from Cuba, having made his appearance in the camp of the Cincinnati Reds, the pitching staff was complete today with the exception of Bill McCoy, a semi-professional from St. Joseph, Mo.

It was expected that Charley Dressen, third baseman, would join the Reds at Miami Saturday for their series with the Athletics, leaving but one regular, Val Pietsch, catcher, on the absence list.

BILL RINEHART TO AID McEWAN AT UNIVERSITY

EUGENE, Ore., Mar. 7 (AP)—Bill Rinehart, Oregon varsity football and baseball coach has been appointed backfield coach of the Oregon football team by the executive council of the university.

Rinehart has coached basketball and baseball at Oregon six years and has had charge of Frosh football team several seasons. He will replace Eugene Vidal, former West-back at the position under John J. McEwan, head coach.

McEwan has announced he will coach an all-western eleven scheduled to play an east-west football game in New York City December 14, this year. He was granted permission to coach the eleven by the executive council.

The east-west game will be under the supervision of the New York American Legion. McEwan will be at liberty to choose his players from the entire western section of the United States. The eastern coach probably will be Knute Rockne of Notre Dame.

Blackburne has intimated the lineup will be: Autry, catcher; Shires, first; Kerr, second; Kamm, third; and Cissell, shortstop. A merry fight is waging for the outfield post, however.

With Bill Cissell doing most of the hitting, the "regulars" defeated the "goofs" 9 to 3, in the first practice game yesterday. Bill Ward, big right hander from Ypsilanti, Mich., state normal, was the "goat" of the game. He tolled four rounds for the "goofs," walking seven, hitting one.

With a fall apiece and the match depending upon the third fall, Edwards kicked Thye in the stomach while the latter was on the canvas. Referee Rutledge promptly awarded the match to Thye. Edwards took the first fall with his knuckle headlock in 23 minutes, 20 seconds. Thye made short work of the second fall with his wristlock, taking the fall in six minutes, 40 seconds. They had been wrestling eight minutes for the final fall when the foul came.

In a half hour preliminary, Pat McCarthy, Boston, and Chet Wiles, Portland, each took a fall for a draw.

Horton Smith Is Winner Of Fort Myers Tourney

FORT MELEERS, Fla., Mar. 7 (AP)—Missouri's young masher swinger, Horton Smith, of Joplin, Mo., won the Fort Myers tournament golf after winning the first annual Fort Myers open here yesterday.

Smith is entered in the \$12,000 Lagoree open at Miami next week. The son of the Ozark, whose 21st birthday is two months away, defeated Denmore Shute, Columbus, Ohio, professional, one up on the eleventh green yesterday in a play-off after they had tied with 281 each at the end of the 72-hole route.

New Course Record

Smith set a new course record in the final rounds with two 67's each five strokes below par. Gene Sarazen with a 282 finished third followed by Clarence Hackney, Atlantic City, N. J., Willie MacFarlane Oakridge, N. Y., former national open champion, and two score other veteran stars.

Smith received \$600 for winning the tourney. Shute won \$400 and Sarazen \$200. The balance of the \$2,000 prize money was distributed to the runners up.

In the play-off Smith and Shute halved ten straight holes. Coming

to the eleventh, both got long drives on the par five hole. Shute was just short of the green on his second and took three more to get down, while Smith's second landed on the green and he scored a birdie in two putts for a win.
