5,000 Airplanes Built Last Year In This Country

NEW YORK, Mar. 8 (AP)—Aircraft yearbook figures released here by the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce of America show an increase of 140 per cent in commercial aircraft production in 1928. Approximately 5,000 planes and 3,500 aircraft motors were built in the United States last year with a valuation of more than \$75,000,000.

Of these 3,750 were commercial ships and 2,937 were military use, the rest being for military use.

More Biplanes
In the commercial field biplanes outnumbered monoplanes two to one, but the valuation of the monoplanes was greater. This is explained by the increasing use of biplanes for small open cockpit ships and of monoplanes for larger cabin jobs.

The figures place Wichita, Kan., in the lead for production with 927 planes built during the year. New York is second with 857 planes but the value of the New York ships was more than twice that of the Wichita output, there being more than 1,000 large cabin jobs.

California Eighth
In the number of planes built Ohio was the third state with 313, Missouri fourth with 236, Colorado fifth with 241, Illinois sixth with 243, Michigan seventh with 181, and California eighth with 140.

The estimated gross value of aircraft built in various states follows: New York \$6,000,000; Missouri, \$3,500,000; Kansas and Michigan, \$3,000,000 each; Ohio, \$2,500,000; California, \$1,500,000; Colorado, \$750,000; and Illinois, \$500,000.

New Jersey and Connecticut led in engine production with Michigan, New York and California following in that order.

Income Tax Pointers

No. 28

Taxes on personal property and real estate paid during the taxable year 1928 are deductible. The revenue act of 1928 permits the deduction of taxes assessed against local benefits, such as, for example, taxes imposed by drainage or irrigation districts, to the extent that such taxes are properly allocable to maintenance and interest charges. The deduction of estate and inheritance taxes is confined to the estate. Retroactive provision pertaining to deductions of estate and inheritance taxes also are found in the new revenue act.

The Federal income tax may not be deducted. However, income taxes imposed upon the income of individuals by States may be deducted by an individual on his Federal income tax return.

Customs duties paid by a person on articles imported for his own use are deductible. Admission taxes are deductible, but the taxpayer must show that account has been kept of the amount paid during the year. Guesswork will not be accepted.

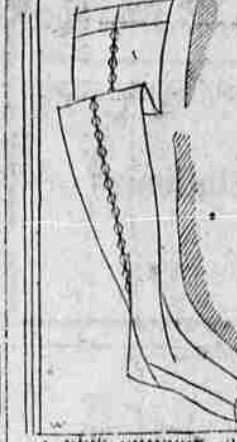

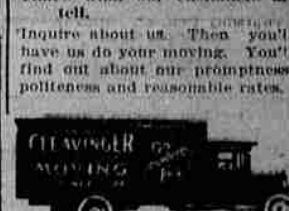
