ROBINS SLOW IN GETTING STARTED

Vance Still a Hold-out; Robinson Has Difficulty Concealing Frowns

CLEARWATER, Fla., March 11.—(AP)—Willard Robinson, the "Jolly Robby" of Brooklyn baseball, finds it harder to display his beaming smile as the Robins, established and presumptive, go about their training. Any frowns Robby may be concealing were justified. His star pitcher is out of the nest, his captain and shortstop, about whom he expects to build his team, is suffering from a sore arm and he has some fielders who can't hit and some hitters who can't field.

Big Day Vance, the speedball king of the National league, is having valuable days of preparation for a busy season while he confines his attention to the business office instead of the ball field. The manager thinks the club officials have underestimated his value by about \$2,500 and wants his contract figures revised.

Weight is Patient
Glenn Wright, a great shortstop for Pittsburgh, pulled up with a lame arm in his first day of practice and is under treatment. Until the extent of the injury is finally determined, Manager Robinson's plans for his infield combination must remain uncertain.

Brooklyn lacks coordination in some of the players. If Wally Gibbert could hit like either Babe Herman or Harvey Hendrick he would be a third base sensation and if either of the club's star hitters could come up with the bats Gilbert got, Robby would worry much less. "Too early," says the manager when asked if he had made a tentative arrangement of his infield and outfield combinations. The task may be a trifle difficult much later.

Two Posts Assigned
Two positions seem assigned. Del Hissnette, who can hit and field, will play first base and Herman will take care of right field. Herman is no ball hawk but he is the club's best hitter.

Jack Pivora was given a tentative advantage at second base in the pre-season calculations but Billy Kibiel, who has had two trials with the club has complicated the situation by his good playing in practice.

Rube Bressler will be an outfielder, at least part of the time. Max Rosenfeld, one of the University of Alabama crop of football and baseball players, John Frederick, a Memphis graduate, the much traveled Henry Collop and Hal Lee, a former infielder, furnish an interesting contest for the available outfield openings. Max Carney is listed as an outfielder but probably he will coach and act as first base until Manager Robbinson much of his time.

Pitchers Back
Seven of last year's pitching staff, excluding Vance, are back. Thus far there has been no indication at the training camp that any of the veterans will be displaced. The holdovers are Doug McWeney, Watson Clark, Big Jim Elliott, Rube Ehrhardt, Ray Moss and Louis Kouppal.
